College Profile

Established in 1972, by the Delhi government the college has been named after Satyawati Devi an ardent freedom fighter from Delhi. Behan Satyawati combined her zest for national liberation with the cause of freedom for women. She was instrumental in drawing a large number of women from their homes into the Civil Disobedience movement in Delhi. Her inspiring speeches and defiant act of making salt in the marshy land of Shahdra led to her imprisonment. While in jail, she continued to inspire women to struggle for freedom from British rule. Mahatma Gandhi in appreciation of her zeal called her 'Toofani Behan'. The college strives to live by the spirit of this immortal heroine of our freedom struggle.

Satyawati College has a sprawling green campus spread over ten acres with a student body of roughly 2500 boys and girls. The college attracts students

from diverse socio-economic, cultural and regional backgrounds, and provides them a healthy atmosphere to mingle with each other.

Our students have performed brilliantly in the University examination year after year. Besides academic distinctions, students from the college have excelled in sports and other co-curricular activities. Student societies like Art and Culture, Debating, Dramatics, Film and Photography, NCC, NSS, WDC alongwith individual departmental societies contribute to make the college a lively, dynamic space for a young student. Through these activities the college tries to facilitate the process of creative and critical thinking amongst students. A dedicated faculty of teachers mentor the overall development of students.





Infrastructure

Satya Auditorium

A state-of-the art auditorium with a seating capacity of 825 is one of the best in Delhi University. It has all the modern facilities like a state of the art sound and lights panel rendering it a perfect venue for lectures and dance, music, dramatic performances etc. Satya auditorium named after Satyawati ji has given a fresh phillip to the co-curricular activities in the college.





Seminar Room

A fully air-conditioned seminar room equipped with acoustics and visual technology is one of the prized possessions of the college. Debates, discussions, lectures, film screening are organized here on a regular basis.

Computer Labs

Satyawati College campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Any student can access internet on his/her laptop from anywhere in the campus by obtaining a username and password from the server room. There are two well equipped computer laboratories with around 100 ports.

The laboratories also have computers with JAWS- a screen reading software- to facilitate reading for visually challenged students. Besides it two new Computer Labs in the new building with even better facilities will start functioning shortly.



Dr. MK Haldar Memorial Library

The college library named after the founder principal has a collection of more than 70,000 volumes and is ever growing with new additions every year. The library has an impressive collection of books, encyclopaedias, journals and periodicals. Overhead projector, LCD projector, sound projector are also housed in the college library for the use of departments and ECA societies.

It has a spacious airconditioned reading hall. There are customised computers with internet facility and learning aids like tape recorders, cassettes, Braille reading material etc. to facilitate learning for visually challenged students. Library staff is warm, friendly and always ready to assist students.



Medical Facility Room

College has a medical room in Room No. 20 Dr. Anju Gupta (MBBS) is the visiting doctor. The students can consult their health problems there during 10:00A.M. to 1:00 P.M. on all working days..

Canteen

College canteen near the sports complex is THE place for students to unwind. Under a canopy of trees overlooking the sports ground it is the hotspot of the college. The canteen provides food and beverages at affordable prices to the college fraternity. A new canteen in the new utility block with even better facilities will start functioning shortly.





Sports Complex

Satyawati College has one of the best sports facilities in Delhi University. Department of Physical Education provides able guidance to students who are interested in different sporting activities. The college has a double-storey sports complex. A lush green sports ground with a well laid out cricket pitch is a delight for cricketers. Annual sporting events like Sandeep Suri Memorial Cricket Tournament have earned reputation for themselves with widespread participation of teams from Delhi/ NCR region. Our students have brought laurels to college by winning several inter-college, inter-university, National and International events. The college provides an ideal sporting atmosphere for differently abled students as well. Some of these students have represented India and won medals in the International events.



Life Beyond Classroom

Art and Culture Society

'Utkarsh' the Art and Culture society is committed to unplug the latent creative energy of young students. Dance, musical performances organised round the year give a special flavour to the life in college. Our students are well trained in several classical and folk forms of dance and singing. Students have won several inter-college competitions and left the spectators spellbound with their performances on a number of occasions.

Debating Society

Debating society organises intra and inter-college debates in English and Hindi on pertinent topics, on a regular basis. Besides focussing on honing oratorial skills of students, the society also motivates them to enrich the content through research. This society trains students to analyse and argue with conviction. The debaters' of Satyawati College have won prizes in several intercollege competitions.

Dramatic Society

One of the most active societies of the college dramatics society holds theatre workshops, lectures and drama productions. This society recognises the need for young people to express their emotions creatively. Through focussed theatre workshops, hidden acting talents are recognised and polished which invariably results in brilliant performances by amateurs.

Family Counselling Centre

The Family Counselling Centre organises a wide range of activities round the year aimed at creating gender awareness. The centre maintains a library which has a rich collection of books, pamphlets, films on issues related to gender. This centre also provides counselling services to students. FCC is open to all students.

Film Society

The college has decided to start two new societies in the current academic session. The film society will conduct regular film screenings which would be followed by discussions analysing the theme, technique etc. This society would try to use films as a medium for collective learning.

Photography Society

Photography society will conduct photography workshops for students and would train them to use camera.

National Cadet Corps

The NCC unit of the college trains boys and girls as cadets in the Army and Navy wings. Our cadets have had the honour of participating in the Republic Day parade and Special National Camps. Rigorous training that the students undergo in NCC helps them maintain a fine balance between mind and body.

National Service Scheme

College has an active group of student volunteers associated with the NSS. The NSS volunteers conduct reading sessions for visually challenged students. Their activities include working with nearby slum population, organising and participating in blood donation camps, teaching children of construction workers in the college campus.

Committee for Career Counselling and Placement

This committee prepares students for their professional lives after college. Students acquire soft skills through workshops, lectures conducted by eminent people. It co-ordinates with the

placement cell of Delhi University and assists students in the registration process. In the previous academic year committee invited finance, banking and health management companies to the college for campus placements. Forty students were selected for recruitment.

Equal Opportunity Cell

The EOC's thrust is to provide an environment conducive to the special needs of differently abled students of the college. The college EOC co-ordinates with the University EOC to provide better amenities. EOC has been instrumental in providing i-pods to visually challenged students, computers with JAWS in the library and computer laboratory. The efforts of EOC and college on the whole makes Satyawati College a preferred destination for differently- abled students.

Foreign Students' Advisory Committee

Foreign students' advisory committee oversees the activities of foreign students' society. The committee facilitates participation of foreign students in the college activities and ensures that they feel at home in their new surroundings.

SC/ST Committee

The committee endeavours to empower students belonging to the deprived sections admitted to the college under reserved categories. It conducts workshops for personality development, acquiring computer skills and developing communication skills for these students. There are remedial classes held for the benefit of students who find it difficult to cope with the curriculum.

College Magazine Committee

The college publishes a magazine annually which has poems, stories, essays by students and teachers. The college magazine provides students with an opportunity to express themselves creatively. The magazine named Ujjwala is multi-lingual with a section each in English, Hindi, Sanskrit and Urdu.

College Committee against Sexual Haraasment

It deals with all the incidents amounting to any kind of Sexual Harassment within the premises of the College as well as public transport. Dr. Chitra Mishra & Dr. Kanchan Sharma are Convener and Co-convener of this committee.

Students Union

Satyawati College has a Students' Union which is elected by the students every year.

College Festival

The Annual College festival 'UTSAV' is held jointly by the Arts and Culture Society and the Students Union. The Festival provides an ideal opportunity to the students to show their individual and collective talent in the various competitions.

Financial Assistance

- 1. Half and full fee concessions are granted to the poor and deserving students. Applications for fee concessions must be submitted on the prescribed forms available in the College Accounts Office.
- 2. Students belonging to Schedule Castes/ Schedule Tribes are awarded Post Metric Scholarship by the Directorate of Education, Delhi Government. For details contact the Schedule Castes/Schedule Tribes Committee.
- 3. Students belonging to Schedule Castes/ Schedule Tribes/ OBC/ PWD are awarded Scholarship by University Grant Commission. Students should submit their scholarship form for the academic year by February. For further details contact in Room No. 1.
- 4. College also provides financial assistance to deserving and needy students from Students Aid Fund.

(General Rules for Financial Assistance)

- 1. Fee concession is subject to good conduct, regular attendance and satisfactory progress in studies and may be withdrawn at any time if a student is found neglecting any of these.
- 2. Students enjoying fee concession are liable to forfeit the same if they fail to get promoted to the next higher class.
- 3. Students will have to pay full fee till they have been granted fee concession.
- 4. Particulars of Scholarships granted by the Delhi Government, University of Delhi, or other agencies, are displayed on the College Notice Board from time to time on receipt of the Schemes in the College.

General Rules for Admission

- 1. Admission to various courses will be made according to the procedure and guidelines laid down by the University of Delhi
- 2. The College gives a relaxation of 3% in the aggregate marks to girl applicants.
- 3. The admission will be granted only to those students who fall within the range of various lists announced by the College i.e. if a student does not take admission in the list in which he is eligible, he / she will not be admitted in the subsequent lists.
- 4. If a student who takes admission in O.B.C. category and in the next list becomes eligible for General category he / she will be transferred to this category.
- 5. The applicants shall be required to produce following documents in original with one set of self-attested photocopies at the time of admission:
 - i. Class X Board Examination Certificate
 - ii. Class X Marks-Sheet
 - iii. Class XII Marks-Sheet
 - iv. Class XII Provisional Certificate/ Original Certificate
 - v. Character Certificate (recent)
 - vi. SC/ST Certificate (in the name of the candidate) issued by the competent authority
 - vii. OBC (Non- Creamy Layer) Certificate (in the name of the Candidate)) issued by competent authority
 - viii. Transfer Certificate from school/ college as well as Migration Certificate from Board/ University are required from those students who have passed senior secondary exam from outside Delhi
 - ix. At least three passport size self-attested photographs.
 - The University will accept self-attested copies of documents/papers provided by the students. It is made clear that if any false attestation/falsified records are detected, the student will be debarred from attending any course in the University/ or its Colleges for next five years and in addition, a criminal case under relevant sections of IPC (viz. 470,471,474 etc.) will be instituted against him/her.
- 6. Students should note that admissions are made strictly on merit. All admissions are provisional. If any discrepancy is found at any stage the admission is liable to be cancelled.
- 7. For admission to M.A., the applicant should be twenty years of age as on 1st October 2013.
- 8. All information regarding admission will be displayed on the College Notice Board. No individual intimation regarding admission will be sent. Therefore, applicants should see College Notice Board for information regarding admission.
- 9. The decision of the Admission Committee will be final.
- 10. The successful students will have to deposit the fees within the prescribed period, failing which the admission will automatically stand cancelled. Fees may be deposited in cash with the Punjab National Bank situated with in the College premises.
- 11 Rounding off fraction in the percentage of marks is not permissible for admission to any course in the College.
- 12. The College does not admit/re-admit the following categories of students:
 - (a) Those who failed in a university examination.
 - (b) Those who failed to take university examination for any reason including shortage of attendance.
 - (c) Those whose results were withheld on account of use of unfair means.

- 13. Students are strictly advised not to make any payment for admission to any one without obtaining a proper receipt.
- 14. For any information and advice regarding admission, candidates should contact Admission Counsellors & Guides in Room No. 1.
- 15. Gap year students will not be admitted. However, the following categories of students may be considered for admission:
 - (a) Students whose results were declared late last year and could, therefore, not be admitted in 2012-2013 session.
 - (b) Students who could not seek admission last year because of some genuine medical reasons certified by Government/ Recognised Hospitals.
 - (c) Students who were engaged in studies of various professional courses.

Students of above category with one year gap may be admitted on furnishing an undertaking on a Rs. 10/- non-judicial paper that he/she was neither expelled from any institution nor was involved in any criminal activity nor he/she took admission in any other College.

- 16. Students are allowed to self attest copies of their documents/papers.
- 17. No outward migration is allowed from the College.

Withdrawal from the College

Whenever a student of Ist year wants to withdraw from the College, he/she should submit an application to the Principal on a prescribed form available in the Accounts Department. The refund of fees will be made as per University rules.

Smoking Free Zone

Delhi University is partnering with Delhi Police & World Lung Foundation (South Asia) in promoting a Tobacco free environment. As a step in that direction, smoking is banned in our College.

Mr. Shashi Shekhar and Dr. Qamar-Ul-Hasan are the Anti-Smoking Nodal Officers of our College for the academic year 2013-14.

Eligibility Criteria for Admissions

The eligibility criteria mentioned below for each course is the minimum eligibility and additional criterion decided by the college. Only those candidates who fulfill these criteria besides meeting the cut-off percentages will be considered for admissions to different courses. The qualifying examination for undergraduate courses is Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination conducted by CBSE or an equivalent examination thereto.

M.A. (Political Science)

Students seeking admission to M.A. Political Science should get themselves registered with the Faculty of Arts, University of Delhi. Admissions will be made on the basis of admission list prepared by the Faculty.

All Bachelor with Honours Courses

Student seeking admission must have secured a minimum of 45% marks in the qualifying examination. Subjects from the vocational stream and subjects from the academic stream like Physical Education, Fine Arts, Home Science, Painting, Drawing, Agriculture, Music, Dance Commercial Arts, Shorthand & Typewriting will not be considered in Bachelor with Honours in Commerce, Economics, English, History, Maths & Pol. Science However, only one of the above subjects may be considered for Bachelor with Honours in Hindi, Sanskrit and Urdu.

Bachelor with Honours in Commerce

- (a) 8% marks in aggregate will be deducted if none of the following four subjects have been studied by the student:
- (b) 6% marks in aggregate will be deducted if only one of the following four subjects have been studied by the student:

- (c) 4% marks in aggregate will be deducted if two of the following four subjects have been studied by the student:
- (d) 2% marks in aggregate will be deducted if three of the following four subjects have been studied by the student:

(Four Subject are: Mathematics, Accounts, Business Studies and Economics)

One of the subjects like Computer Sciences, Informatics Practices, Entrepreneurship, Web & Multimedia Technology, Accounting & Auditing Marketing Salesmanship, Purchasing & Storekeeping and Banking may be considered.

Bachelor with Honours in Economics

- 1. Candidate must have secured a minimum of 60% marks each in English and Mathematics in Class XII.
- 2. Two subjects from the academic stream and **only Banking** as a subject, from the vocational stream will be considered.

Bachelor with Honours in English

- 1. Candidate must have secured a minimum of 70% in Elective English or 75% marks in Core English in Class XII.
- 2. Computer Science and Fine Arts may be considered in best four subjects.

Bachelor with Honours in Hindi

Candidate must have secured a minimum of 60% in Hindi core/elective in Class XII.

Bachelor with Honours in History

Candidate must have offered History as a subject in Class XII. Those who have not done so will be considered with a deduction of 5% marks from the aggregate.

Bachelor with Honours in Mathematics

- 1. Candidate must have secured a minimum of 75% marks in Mathematics or 85% marks in Business Mathematics in the qualifying exam.
- 2. Computer Science and Informatics Practices may be considered.

Bachelor with Honours in Political Science

Candidate must have offered Political Science as a subject in Class XII. Those who have not done so will be considered with a deduction of 5% marks from the aggregate.

Bachelor with Honours in Sanskrit

- 1. Candidate must have secured a minimum of 45% marks in the aggregate in the qualifying exam with 40% in Sanskrit in Class X/XII.
- 2. Candidate with 40% marks in the aggregate may also be considered for admissions only if he/she has scored 50% marks in Sanskrit in the qualifying examination.

Bachelor with Honours in Urdu

- 1. Candidate with 40% marks in the aggregate may also be considered for admissions only if he/she has scored 50% marks in Urdu in the qualifying examination.
- 2. Those students who have not offered Urdu as a core/elective subject but have Urdu as mother tongue may be considered subject to qualifying a language proficiency test conducted by the department.

University/College Ward Quota

Three seats each are reserved for teaching and non-teaching University / College employees. The students seeking admission under this category are advised to submit their applications alongwith all documents in Room No. 1 to Ms. Kiran Kalra, S.O. (Admn.).

Admission on Sports Basis

- 1. 5% seats in all courses are reserved for Sports and ECA.
- 2. Only those students who have submitted the separate Sports Form in the college during June 5-19, 2013, will be considered for admission on the basis of Sports
- 3. University norms and guidelines will be adhered to.

Admission on the Basis of ECA

Five seats are reserved under Extra Curricular Activities for the following disciplines:

(i) Dance — Classical/Folk(ii) Music — Vocal/Instrumental

(iii) Dramatics — Acting

(iv) Elocution — Subject will be given on the spot by the Judges.

Selection will be made on the basis of university guidelines for ECA Admission.

Only those students who have submitted the separate (ECA) Form in the college during June 5-19, 2013, will be considered for admission on the basis of ECA.

Discipline & Attendance Rules

- 1. Students are accountable for their conduct to the Principal of the College and are prohibited from doing anything, either inside or outside the College, which may amount to breach of repute, discipline or interference with the discipline and normal working of the College. A student shall be liable to disciplinary action for violating any of the rules of discipline. Disciplinary actions involve warning, and/or fine and/or suspension from the class, from examination, from the College or any such action as provided in ordinance XV-B and the rules of discipline framed under it. Pending an enquiry into his/her conduct, the authorities have the right to suspend a student from the College.
- 2. Students should take proper care of College property and must not spoil or cause any damage to or tamper with furniture and fittings.
- 3. Names of students who indulge in acts of indiscipline in the university examination may be struck off from the College rolls.
- 4. Ragging in any from is banned. Any student found indulging in it would be guilty of gross indiscipline and an FIR will be filed against him/her with the police as per the decision of the Hon. Supreme Court. Any one found indulging in eve-teasing shall also be dealt with under ordinance XV-B & XV-C.
- 5. In the matter of attendance lectures and tutorials, the students of the College are governed by the rules and regulations of the University of Delhi including DU EC resolution no. 138 dated 05-06-1975. No student is eligible for promotion to the next higher class or to take a University Examination unless he/she has attended two-third of the lectures, tutorials and preceptorial held separately.
- 6. All application for leave of absence due to sickness must be supported by a Medical Certificate and should reach the Principal not later than a week after the student returns to the College after his/her illness. This rule will be enforced strictly in giving benefit of attendance on medical ground.
- 7. The areas near the classrooms are marked as the Silence Zone. Therefore, students are advised not to loiter/ make noise in this zone. They are advised to utilize their free periods for creative activities such as visiting library, playing games etc.
- 8. An Identity Card is issued to each student at the time of admission. A student is not allowed to enter college premises without showing his/her identity card at the College gate. A student must carry his/her identity card while he/she is in the college premises. Duplicate identity card will be issued on payment of Rs. 25/- subject to report of loss to the College authorities.
- 9. All information is displayed on the student notice board. Hence, students are advised to read notices regularly. Ignorance of any notice will not be accepted as a plea or an excuse for any delay in any matter.
- 10. Suggestion Box has been provided on the ground floor near the library. Students are advised to make use of it.
- 11. Students are not permitted to receive or entertain visitors in the College. In case such visits are essential, prior permission of the principal is necessary.

Important Information

- 1. Students opting for DC-I will not be entitled to opt for DC-II in the same discipline. For example students opting for History in DC-I will not be allowed to opt for History in DC-II. However, Commerce students will be allowed to opt for management group (offered by Faculty of Management Studies, DU) in DC-II.
- 2. All the course of study are open to modification/change in title/content after due process during the duration of this programme and enrolment of the student. Students who rejoin the course at any time within the prescribed span period will have to study by the courses which will be on offer at the time of her/his readmission to the course.
- 3. The student who opts for all Six courses of Discipline II (DC II) offered by a department shall be eligible for admission to the respective Postgraduate degree course offered by the Department after qualifying an Entrance Test.
- 4. Any student shall have the option of not pursuing all 6 courses of DC II in a single discipline and can instead choose 3 courses each in two distinct DC II disciplines from the available list of DC II disciplines offered by the College.
- 5. The student may opt for the Applied Courses from among the Applied Courses offered by the College during a particular academic year.
- 6. In view of the special needs of the students with disability, suitable modifications shall be made in the curriculum, mode of Instruction and assessment.

Ordinances

16.1 Ordinance VII (2)

The following provisions shall be applicable to students admitted to the four year undergraduate programme:

a. A candidate for the Semester I/III/V/VII Examination shall not be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions of attendance unless s/he has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than two thirds of the lectures/practical/presentations/tutorials required to be attended provided that a student of the Semester I/III/V/VII who does not fulfil the required conditions of attendance, as above, but has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent of lectures/practical/presentations during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the Principal of the College concerned, appear for the ensuing semester Examination; but such a candidate shall be required to make up the deficiency at lectures and practicals, in the next semester of the same academic year.

Provided that a student of the II/IV/VI semester who does not fulfill the required conditions of attendance as above, but has attended in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent of the lectures/practical/presentation/tutorials, held during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the Principal of the College concerned, be allowed to appear at the ensuing examination provided that s/he makes up the deficiency of the said attendance by combining the attendance of the previous semester in the ensuing semester.

Provided further that the Principal of the College concerned may permit a student to appear in an examination notwithstanding that the student has not fulfilled the attendance requirement, if in the opinion of the Principal, such student shall make up the deficiency in the succeeding academic year.

Provided further that a student of the IV/VI/VIII semester who seeks to exit with a Diploma/Bachelor's degree/Bachelor's with Honours/B.Tech degree shall be allowed to appear at the IV/VI/VIII Semester Examination, as the case may be, if by combining the attendance of the two/three/four academic years as the case may be, the candidate has put in two-thirds of attendance, in all the subjects taken together, held during the respective years.

- b. In the case of a student who is selected as a member of the N.C.C. to participate in the annual N.C.C. Camps or is deputed to undertake Civil Defence work and allied duties or in the case of a student who is enrolled in the National Service Scheme and is deputed to various public assignments by or with the approval of the Principal/ Head of the institution concerned or a student who is selected to participate in sports or other activities organised by the Inter-University Board or in national or international fixtures in games and sports approved by the Competent Authority or a student who is required to represent the University at the Inter-University Youth Festival, or a student who is required to participate in periodical training in the Territorial Army or a student who is deputed by the College to take part in Inter-College sports or fixtures, debates, seminars, symposia or social work projects or a student who is required curricular activities held in other Universities or such other activities approved by the Vice-Chancellor for this purpose, in calculating the total number of lectures etc. delivered in the College, or in the University, as the case may be, for his course of study in each academic year, the number of lectures etc., in each subject delivered, during the period of absence for that purpose shall be excluded.
- c. The Principal of a College may consider, on the basis of the Medical Certificates produced, exceptionally hard cases of students who had fallen seriously ill or had met with an accident during the year disabling them from attending classes for a certain period, with a view to determining whether the lectures etc. delivered during the said period, or a part thereof, could be excluded for purposes of calculation of attendance of the year and decide each case on its own merits.
- d. Colleges shall be required to notify the attendance position of each of its students for each month on the noticeboard of the College, and clearly indicate the lectures/practical held subject wise and the numbers attended by each student.
- e. A College shall notify on the notice board the final attendance position of each of its students within five days of the dispersal of the classes in the last session of the academic year. Not later than five days, thereafter, a student may, by an application to the Principal of the college, claim benefit of exclusion of lectures under sub-clause (a) above on grounds to be specified and accompanied by the relevant documents. All such applications submitted within time shall be considered and disposed of by the Principal of the College at least 3 days prior to the commencement of the examination, in which the student is intending to appear.
- f. The benefit of exclusion of lectures contemplated in categories above, either separately or jointly, shall in no case exceed 1/3 of the total number of lectures /practicals/presentations/tutorials.
- g. In the case of a married woman student who is granted maternity leave, in calculating the total number of lectures delivered in the College or in the University, as the case may be, for her course of study in each semester, the number of lectures in each subject delivered during the period of her maternity leave shall not be taken into account.

h. No person shall be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions in respect of his instructions, unless in addition to the requirements regarding attendance and other conditions, he has appeared and satisfied by his performance the Principal of his college in such tests, written and/or oral, as may be held by him in his discretion. The Principal of the College shall have, and shall be deemed always to have had, the power to detain a student in the same class in which he has been studying, or not to send him up for the University Examination, in case he did not appear at the tests aforesaid or his performance was not satisfactory. The Principal of a College/Head of the Institution shall have power to strike off the name of a student who is grossly irregular in attendance inspite of warning, or when the absence of the student is for such a long period that he cannot put in requisite percentage of attendance.

16.2 Ordinance VIII (2)

For all students obtaining admission under the four-year undergraduate programme starting 2013-14, the span period to complete the course will be ten years from the year of admission in the First Semester.

irrespective of whether the students will be awarded a Diploma, Bachelor Degree or Bachelor with Honours / B.Tech Degree, provided the student has completed all requirements to become eligible for appearing in the University examinations as per rules.

16.3 Ordinance IX

The following provisions shall be applicable to students admitted to the four year undergraduate programme:

- a. A student who appears in an odd semester examination or who was eligible to appear in the odd semester examination but remains absent in any or all the papers of the said semester, shall move on to the next even semester irrespective of his/her result in the said examination.
- b. A student who has obtained 40% on the aggregate taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment/ project work) and practical examinations, separately, conducted in the first and second semesters shall be promoted to the second academic year/third semester.
- c. A student who has obtained 40% on the aggregate taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment/project work) and practical examinations, separately, conducted in the third and fourth semesters shall be promoted to the third academic year/fifth semester provided s/he has not exercised the option to exit with a Diploma degree.
- d. A student who has obtained 40% on the aggregate taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment/project) and practical examinations, separately, conducted in the fifth and sixth semesters shall be promoted to the fourth academic year/seventh semester provided s/he has not exercised the option to exit with a Bachelor's Degree.
- (11) Eligibility for award of Diploma/Degree. The following shall be applicable to students admitted to the four year undergraduate programme:
- a. If a student has secured an aggregate of minimum 40% marks taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment) and practical examinations separately till the end of the second year, i.e., up to the end of fourth semester, then s/he shall be awarded a Diploma, if s/he exercises the option to exit at the end of the second year.
- b. If a student has secured an aggregate of minimum 40% marks taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment/project/ continuous evaluation, where applicable) and practical examination separately till the end of the third year, i.e., up to the end of sixth semester, then s/he shall be awarded the Bachelor's degree if s/he exercises the option to exit at the end of the third year.
- c. If a student has secured an aggregate of minimum 50% marks taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment/project/ continuous evaluation, where applicable) and practical examination separately till the end of the fourth year, i.e., up to the end of eighth semester, then s/he shall be awarded the Bachelor's with Honours / B.Tech.
- d. If a student at the end of the eighth semester fails to secure 50% or more marks in aggregate as above or fails in the final year/ semester examination and opts to quit/discontinue his/her studies for the Bachelor degree in Honours/B.Tech, may, on a written application from the student, be awarded the Bachelor degree, provided such a student has secured at least 40% marks in aggregate till the end of the VI Semester.
- e. If a student at the end of the sixth semester fails to secure 40% or more marks in aggregate as above or fails in the third year/ VI semester examination and opts to quit/discontinue his/her studies for the Bachelor degree, may, on a written application from the student, be awarded the Diploma, provided such a student has secured at least 40% marks in aggregate till the end of the IV Semester.
