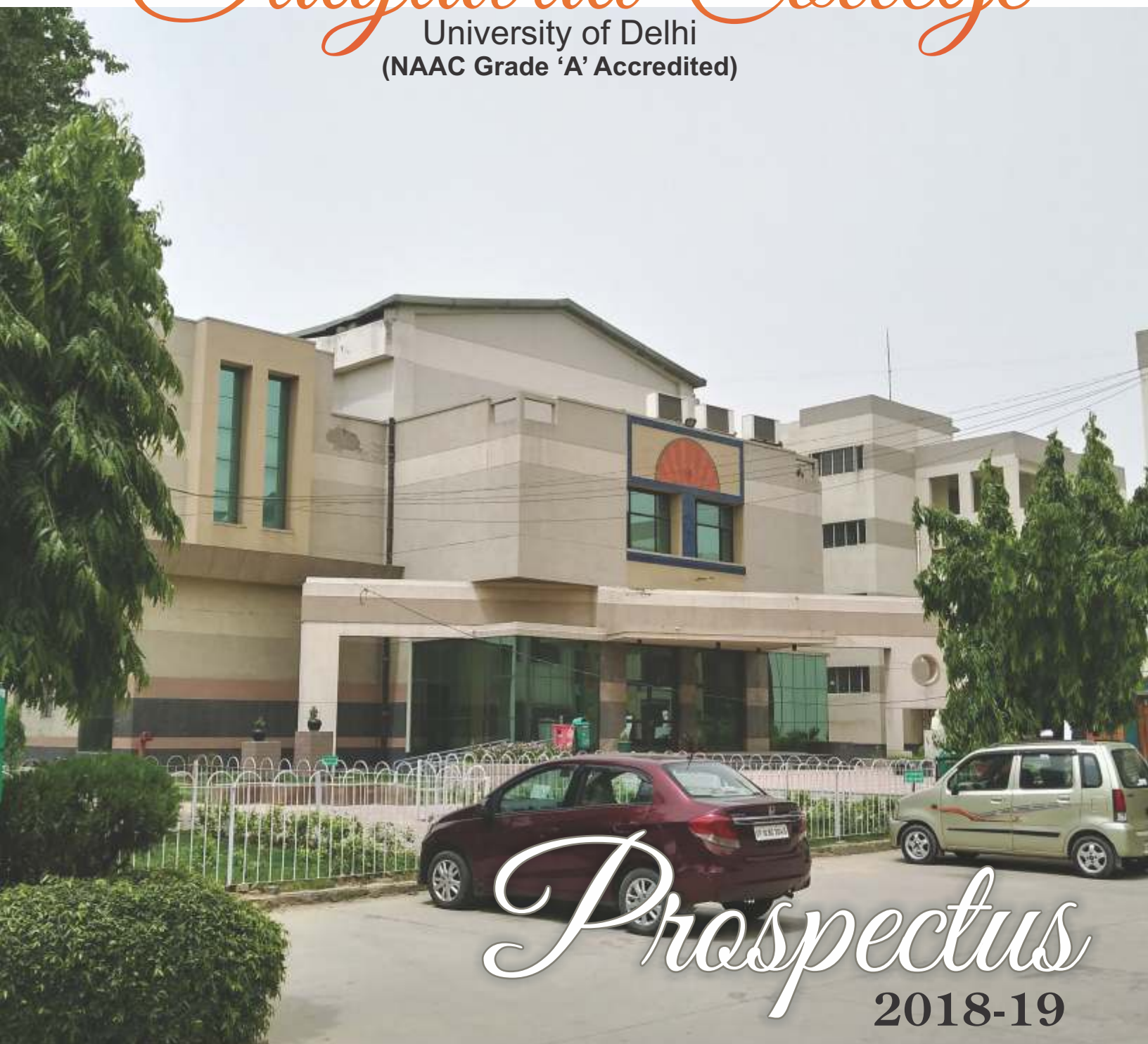

5. Character Certificate (recent)
6. SC/ST Certificate (in the name of the candidate) issued by the competent authority
7. OBC (Non- Creamy Layer) Certificate (in the name of the Candidate) ) issued by competent authority as per Govt. rules
8. Transfer Certificate from school/ college as well as Migration Certificate from Board/ University are required from those students who have passed senior secondary exam from outside Delhi
9. At least three passport size self-attested photographs.

The University will accept self-attested copies of documents/papers provided by the students. It is made clear that if any false attestation/falsified records are detected, the student will be debarred from attending any course in the University/ or its Colleges for next five years and in addition, a criminal case under relevant sections of IPC (viz. 470,471,474 etc.) will be instituted against him/her. # College at a *Glance*

As prospective students of the college, you must know the background & history of the college.

Satyawati College, a constituent college of the University of Delhi was established in 1972. It has been named

after a great freedom fighter बहन सत्यवती who worked in close association with leaders like Mahatma Gandhi,

Jawaharlal Nehru, Jay Prakash Narayan and Sarojini Naidu. She worked tirelessly till her death at an early age

of 39 years, for uprooting poverty, ignorance and communalism. She was named "बहन सत्यवती" by Mahatma Gandhi, for her zeal and commitment. Satyawati Devi, was an ardent freedom fighter from Delhi, who was instrumental in drawing a large number of women from their homes into the "Civil Disobedience Movement". She combined the zest for national liberation with the cause of freedom for women. Her inspiring speeches and acts of defiance during the time of freedom struggle embody the spirit of the College.

Satyawati College, which is run by the Delhi Government, is one of the prominent & prestigious, off-campus colleges of the University of Delhi. The College has grown over the years and has become a mature adult with ten Departments and several courses.

Apart from brilliant academic distinctions, our students have also excelled in extra-curricular activities. The College maintains an inclusive atmosphere for students from diverse socio-economic, cultural and regional background and provides them with the space to interact with each other.

Spread over ten acres of land, the College houses well equipped classrooms, a rich library, and also provides facilities of a seminar room, computer room, canteen, bank, a photocopier, etc. The College offers campus wide Wi-Fi to the students and faculty. It also has one of the finest auditoriums of Delhi University. Student societies like Arts and Culture, Debating, Dramatics, Film and Photography, NSS, NCC, FCC, North East Society, along with individual department based Societies contribute to making the College a lively, dynamic space for our students. Through the activities the College tries to facilitate creative and critical thinking among the students.

A dedicated faculty of teachers works actively towards a holistic development of students so as to enable them to carve out a niche for themselves in their chosen fields.





## Infrastructure

### **SATYA AUDITORIUM**

The college takes pride in having a beautiful and splendid auditorium dedicated to 'Satya' which means truth and named after बहन सत्यवती. It is a perfect venue for lectures, debates, conferences, seminars, drama, dance and other extracurricular activities which will help college in developing the creative ability of the students. A state-of-the-art auditorium with a seating capacity of 825 is one of the best in Delhi University. It has all the modern facilities including best quality sound and lights panel etc.



### **SEMINAR ROOM**

A fully air-conditioned seminar room equipped with acoustics and visual technology is one of the prized possessions of the college. Debates, discussions, lectures, film screening are organized here on a regular basis.

### **COMPUTER LABS**

Satyawati College campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Any student can access internet on his/her laptop from anywhere in the campus by obtaining a username and password from the server room. There are two well equipped computer laboratories with around 100 ports.

The laboratories also have computers with JAWS- a screen reading software- to facilitate reading for visually challenged students. Besides this, two new Computer Labs in the new building, function with best facilities for Students.



### **DR. MK HALDAR MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

The college library named after the founder principal has a collection of more than 70,000 volumes and is ever growing with new additions every year. The library has an impressive collection of books, encyclopedias, journals and periodicals. Overhead projector, LCD projector, sound projector are also housed in the college library for the use of departments and ECA societies.

It has a spacious air-conditioned reading hall. There are customized computers with internet facility and learning aids like tape recorders, cassettes, Braille reading material etc. to facilitate learning for visually challenged students. Library staff is warm, friendly and always ready to assist students.



### **MEDICAL FACILITY ROOM**

The College has a well equipped medical Room No. 20. Dr. Jawaharlal Jain MBBS, D.Sc., MBA [Hosp. Admin.], Ex-Medical Administrator & Medical Consultant, University of Delhi, and Ex-Medical Superintendent, Shanti Mukand Hospital is a visiting Doctor with the College.

The college has also appointed a full time staff nurse for any eventualities. The students can consult the highly experienced Visiting Doctor about their health problems from 10:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. on all working days.

### **CANTEEN**

College canteen is near the Main gate / Entrance. It is a place for students to unwind, relax & rest. The canteen provides good quality food and beverages at affordable prices to the college fraternity.



### **FAMILY COUNSELING CENTRE**

Centre organizes a wide range of activities round the year aimed at creating gender awareness and also provides counseling services to all students





## SPORTS COMPLEX

Satyawati College has one of the best sports facilities in Delhi University. Department of Physical Education provides able guidance to students who are interested in different sporting activities. The college has a double-storey sports complex. A lush green sports ground with a well laid out cricket pitch is a delight for cricketers. Annual sporting events like Sandeep Suri Memorial Cricket Tournament have earned reputation for themselves with widespread participation of teams from Delhi/ NCR region. Our students have brought laurels to college by winning several inter-college, inter-university, National and International events. The college provides an ideal sporting atmosphere for differently abled students as well. Some of these students have represented India and won medals in International events as well.





## *Extra Curricular Activities : Societies And Committees*

### **1. 'UTKARSH'- THE ART AND CULTURE SOCIETY**

The Art and Culture society is committed to unplug the latent creative energy of young students. Dance, musical performances organized round the year, give a special flavor to the life in college. Our students are well trained in several classical and folk forms of dance and singing. Students have won several inter-college competitions and left the spectators spellbound with their performances on a number of occasions.

### **2. 'ABHIVYAKTI'- THE DEBATING SOCIETY**

The Debating Society regularly organizes intra, inter-college and National level debates in English, Hindi, Urdu and Sanskrit. The Society through its activities seeks to cultivate a research oriented competitive debating culture with emphasis on listening skills, intelligent ideation, responsive approach and competent spoken skills. Abhivyakti has conducted debate on various issues such as culture, history, politics, current affairs, law, sports and life. Over the years, our debaters have represented the College in Inter-college, intracollege and national level debates and have made the college proud by winning several prizes.

### **3. 'THE THIRD ACT'- DRAMATICS SOCIETY**

One of the most active societies of the college, the college dramatics society, 'The Third Act', holds theatre workshops, lectures and drama productions. This society recognizes the need for young people to express their emotions creatively. Through focused theatre workshops, hidden acting talents are recognized and polished which invariably results in brilliant performances by amateurs. The students have been provided a spacious room in Block A to conduct their workshops and carry on with their practice.

### **4. FILM SOCIETY**

The film society conducts regular film screenings which are followed by discussions, analysis & overview of the theme, technique etc. This society seeks to use films as a medium for collective learning & creating an understanding that films have more hidden academic messages than what we can see.

### **5. 'TASVEER' PHOTOGRAPHY SOCIETY**

Photography society conducts photography workshops for students and trains them to use the camera. In today's environment of love for 'selfies' and photography, this society is quite popular with students.

### **6. 'SAKSHAM' COMMITTEE FOR CAREER COUNSELING AND PLACEMENT**

This committee prepares students for their professional lives after college. Students acquire soft skills through workshops, lectures conducted by eminent people. Committee co-ordinates with the placement cell of Delhi University and assists students in the registration process. In the previous academic year committee invited finance, banking and health management companies to the college for campus placements. Several students were selected for recruitment.

### **7. FOREIGN STUDENTS' ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

'Foreign students' advisory committee oversees the activities, problems & difficulties, if any, faced by students from other Countries. The committee facilitates participation of foreign students in the college activities and ensures that they feel at home in their new surroundings.

### **8. SC/ST COMMITTEE**

The committee's aim is to empower students belonging to the deprived sections admitted to the college under reserved categories. It conducts workshops for personality development, acquiring computer skills and developing communication skills for these students. There are remedial classes held for the benefit of students who find it difficult to cope with the curriculum.

### **9. THE NORTH EAST SOCIETY**

The North East Society aims to create a welcoming environment for students from the North East, in College. It seeks to enable them to fully participate in College life. The Society also observes an annual North East Day.

#### 10. 'UJJWALA' -THE COLLEGE MAGAZINE

The college publishes a magazine annually which has poems, stories, essays by students and teachers. The college magazine provides students with an opportunity to express themselves creatively. The magazine named 'Ujjwala' is multi-lingual with a section each in English, Hindi, Sanskrit and Urdu.

#### 11. INTERNAL COMPLAINT COMMITTEE AGAINST SEXUAL HARASSMENT

It deals with all the incidents amounting to any kind of Sexual Harassment with in the premises of the College.

#### 12. FAMILY COUNSELING CENTRE

The Family Counseling Centre organizes a wide range of activities round the year aimed at creating gender awareness. The centre maintains a library which has a rich collection of books, pamphlets, and films on issues related to gender. This centre also provides counseling services to students. FCC is open to all students.

#### 13. EQUAL OPPORTUNITY CELL

The Equal Opportunity Cell is committed towards providing a barrier-free environment to facilitate quality education and equitable access to career opportunities for differently-abled students. it has provided laptops (with special software for VH students) to most of the PWD students. Equal Opportunity Cell has also provided 26 DAISY players to our VH students and got repaired old iPods. Regular meetings are held to address student issues.

#### 14. NATIONAL CADET CORPS

The NCC unit of the college trains boys and girls as cadets in the Army and Navy wings. Our cadets have had the honor of participating in the Republic Day parade and Special National Camps. Rigorous training that the students undergo in NCC helps them maintain a fine balance between mind and body. A room in Block- A, first floor has been assigned to the In-charge of NCC.

#### 15. NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

College has an active group of student volunteers associated with the NSS. The NSS volunteers conduct reading sessions for visually challenged students. Their activities include working with nearby slum population, organizing and participating in blood donation camps, teaching children of construction workers in the college campus. The NSS organizes an **Annual Function "Sarokar"** every year.

#### 16. STUDENTS UNION

Satyawati College has a Students' Union which is elected by the students every year. **However a first year student can only contest for the post of Central Councilor**, the rest of the posts of the union are open only to second and third year students.

#### 17. ALUMNI COMMITTEE

Satyawati Alumni committee has been working very actively for last two years. The college is trying to collect data of its old students by social and electronic media. The Alumni meet is organized by the college alumni committee by college funding with the support of teaching n non teaching staff. This year Dr Nirmal Jindal is the convenor of Alumni committee and trying to take it forward by introducing online registration forms for satyawati alumni's and update its list to rope in more n more alumni.

#### COLLEGE FESTIVAL 'UTSAV'

The Annual College festival 'UTSAV' is held jointly by the Arts and Culture Society and the Students Union. The Festival provides an ideal opportunity to the students to show their individual and collective talent in the various competitions.

11. The **A.D. Memorial Trust** sponsored by **Dr. Saroj Gupta** is awarded to **toppers of Sanskrit (Hons.) I & II Year.**
12. The **Guru Sant Raj Aradheya Memorial Prize** sponsored by **Dr. Abha Mathur** is awarded to the topper in paper of "Self-Management Gita".
13. The **Ajeet Jawed Memorial Merit Prize** sponsored by **Dr. M.A. Jawed** is awarded to the **topper in the paper: "Nationalism in India/Colonialism in India".**

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

1. Full and half fee concessions are granted to needy and deserving students. Applications for fee concessions must be submitted on the prescribed forms available in the College Accounts Office.
2. Students belonging to Schedule Castes/ Schedule Tribes are awarded Post Metric Scholarship by the Directorate of Education, Delhi Government. For details contact the Schedule Castes/Schedule Tribes Committee of the College.
3. Students belonging to Schedule Castes/ Schedule Tribes / OBC / PwD are awarded Scholarship by University Grant Commission. Students should submit their scholarship form for each academic year by February. For further details contact Room No. 1.
4. College also provides financial assistance to deserving and needy students from the **Students Aid Fund**.

## GENERAL RULES FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

1. Fee concession is subject to good conduct, regular attendance and satisfactory progress in studies and other conditions specified by the College. It may be withdrawn at any time if a student is found wanting in any of the above conditions.
2. Students availing fee concession are liable to forfeit the same if they fail to get promoted to the next higher class.
3. Students will have to pay the full fee till they have been granted fee concession.
4. Particulars of Scholarships granted by the Delhi Government, University of Delhi, or other agencies, are displayed on the College Notice Board from time to time on receipt of the Schemes in the College.



## General Rules for Admission



1. Admission to various courses will be made according to the procedure and guidelines laid down by the University of Delhi
2. **The College gives a relaxation of 1% in the aggregate marks to female applicants as per University of Delhi Guidelines.**
3. The admission will be granted only to those students who fall within the range of various lists announced by the College. If a student does not take admission in the list in which he / she is eligible, he / she will be considered for admission on the last day of the next list subject to availability of seats.
4. If a student who takes admission in OBC category and in the next list becomes eligible for General category he / she will be transferred to this category.
5. Students should note that admissions are made strictly on merit. All admissions are provisional. If any discrepancy is found at any stage the admission is liable to be cancelled.
6. For admission to M.A., the applicant should be twenty years of age as on 1st October 2015.
7. All the information regarding admission will be displayed on the College Notice Board/College Website. No individual intimation regarding admission will be sent. Therefore, applicants should see College Notice Board / College Website for information regarding admission.
8. The decision of the Admission Committee will be final.
9. The successful students will have to deposit the fees within the prescribed period, failing which the admission will automatically stand cancelled. **Fee has to be deposited online only through University Admission Portal.**
10. Rounding off fraction in the percentage of marks is not permissible for admission to any course in the College.
11. The College does not admit/re-admit the following categories of students :
  - (a) Those who failed in a university examination.
  - (b) Those who failed to take university examination for any reason including shortage of attendance.
  - (c) Those whose results were withheld on account of use of unfair means.
12. For any information and advice regarding admission, candidates should contact 'Helpdesk' available in the college.
13. Gap year students may be admitted on furnishing an undertaking on a Rs. 10/- non-judicial paper that he/she was neither expelled from any institution nor was involved in any criminal activity nor he/she took admission in any other College.
14. Students should self attest all of the copies of their documents / papers.
15. **Process after registration for merit-based admissions:**
  - i. The applicants must check the centralized Admission Web Portal and the respective college websites for the announcements of cut-offs of different programmes.
  - ii. The applicants who meet the requisite cut-off should login to the UG admission portal using their registration account and select college/programme where she/he wishes to take admission and meets the desired cut-off criterion.
  - iii. The applicant shall take a print out of the admission/registration form and along with the list of documents/certificates (see Section 8 for details), proceed to the respective college for verification of mark-sheets/certificates, calculated marks percentage with relation to the cut-off, depending on the

programme/course. The schedule for verification of documents in the colleges is also given in Section 2.6.

- iv. The college will retain the original certificates of the approved applicants in order to avoid multiple admissions. The certificates will remain with the colleges during the admission process. However, the colleges shall promptly return the documents in case student withdraws/cancels her/his admission or the applicant who wishes to appear in counselling of any other university/ institute.
- v. After this, the college will approve the admission on the UG admissions portal. The applicant will then be required to log-on to the UG admission portal to make the online Admission Fee payment (it varies from college to college) through the available online payment options. The approved applicant is permitted to make online admission fee payment till 12 noon of the next day of the last day of admission cut-off list (in which the admission is sought).
- vi. Please note that an applicant's admission in a college is completed only after realization of the fee payment on the UG admission portal within the prescribed time-limit.
- vii. An applicant can take admission only in one programme in one college at any given time. In case an admitted student wishes to withdraw/cancel the admission in any programme/college, she/he may cancel her/his admission online (cancellation fee will be charged as per the University Cancellation Policy), and approach the college to collect her/his certificates where the admission was taken. The applicant can proceed to take admission in another programme/college. Admission fee will be adjusted automatically and the applicant will need to pay only the balance, if the fee is more in the new college/programme in which the admission is being sought. In case the fee is less in the new college/programme, the balance would be refunded to the applicant's account as per the College/University rules after the admissions are closed.
- viii. The requirements for admissions to various Programmes/Courses are provided in Section 4 and Section 5 as mention in university undergraduate admission bulletin. The applicants may also check the details given in Annexure II for calculation of **-Best Four-** subjects' percentage in various programmes.
- ix. The reservation and relaxation policy of the University of Delhi for admission under various categories is provided in undergraduate admission bulletin.
- x. The announcement of **cut-off lists** for all programmes / categories (UR/OBC/SC/ST/PwD/KM) will be made through University website only. The schedule for announcement of cut-off lists is given in section 2.6 of university undergraduate admission bulletin.
- xi. The CW applicants shall check the admission schedule and procedure in undergraduate admission bulletin.
- xii. The applicants seeking admission in NCWEB shall check the admission schedule in Section 2.9 and also check Section 14 for more details.
- xiii. The admission schedule for admissions under Sports/ECA categories will be announced on the centralized admission Web Portal after the registration process is completed.
- xiv. The admission schedule for admissions under Ward Quota (Wards of University/College Employees) will be made during the fourth cut-off list and subsequently thereof.
- xv. The consolidated last cut-offs course/college-wise are provided in Annexure of university bulletin for the academic year 2017-18.
- xvi. The list of colleges/Programmes, where women applicants are provided a concession of 1% in the cut-off for the year 2018-19, is given in Annexure III of university bulletin.
- xvii. The colleges shall admit all the applicants who meet the announced cut-off criteria. There will not be any **-first come first serve-** policy.
- xviii. The applicants who could not take admission in a given cut-off list (where they indeed met the criterion)



may be considered for admission on the last day of admission in the immediate next cut-off list only, subject to availability of seats. For Boards, like International Baccalaureate and others, whose results are declared late, the applicants may be considered for admission during whichever cut-off list their results are declared, subject to availability of seats and provided the applicant had successfully completed the online registration process.

- xix. There shall not be any Additional Eligibility Criterion' for any category in any college/programme.
- xx. The colleges shall strictly follow the University guidelines with respect to gap year policy. The applicants with gap year(s) will not be at any disadvantage for the purpose of admission to the undergraduate programmes.
- xxi. The applicants seeking admission under ECA category may check the Section 9.10.1 and Annexure IV of university bulletin for further details.
- xxii. The applicants seeking admission under Sports category may check the Section 9.10.2 and Annexure V of university bulletin for further details.

**16. Procedure for calculation of -Best Four' subjects percentage for Honours Programmes (For admission to Arts/ Humanities Programmes):**

- a. The merit shall be determined on the basis of one language and three best academic/elective subjects from LIST A.
- b. Out of three, academic/elective subject chosen above, one must be the concerned subject in which the admission is sought, failing which a deduction of 2.5% will be imposed on the calculated Best Four' percentage.

For honours in languages refer to point 6 of Basis of calculation of Best Four given below.

**Note:**

- i. If an applicant doesn't include the subjects given in LIST A in -Best Four', then a deduction of 2.5% of maximum marks will be levied for each subject for the purpose of calculating -Best Four'.
- ii. All subjects to be included in the calculation of -Best Four'must have at least 70% theory component of exam. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only shall be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of „Best Four-.

**Examples**

- (1) If an applicant has scored: Physics 90 (theory 50, practical 40; max. marks theory 60, practical 40), and Chemistry 91(theory 52, practical 39; max. marks theory 60, practical 40) which is not in ratio of 70:30, then the marks can be converted on pro rata basis

Pro rata marks in physics = 88.33;  $((50/60) \times 70 + (40/40) \times 30) = 58.33 + 30 = 88.33$

Pro rata marks in chemistry = 89.92;  $((52/60) \times 70 + (39/40) \times 30) = 60.66 + 29.25 = 89.91$

- (2) If an applicant has scored: Physics 88 (theory 45, IA 14, practical 29; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), Chemistry 92 (theory 48, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), English (90) and Biology 95 (theory 51, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30). Mathematics 92. The marks in Physics, Chemistry and Biology have less than 70% theory component and therefore have to be converted to 70:30 ratio on pro rata basis.

For Physics, it is  $56.25 + 29 = 85.25$ ;  $((45/56) \times 70 + (43/44) \times 30) = 56.25 + 29.3 = 85.55$

For Chemistry, it is  $60 + 30 = 90$ ;  $((48/56) \times 70 + (44/44) \times 30) = 60 + 30 = 90$

For Biology, it is  $63.75 + 30 = 93.75$ ;  $((51/56) \times 70 + (44/44) \times 30) = 63.75 + 30 = 93.75$

The following discipline subjects must be treated as Academic/ Elective subjects for the purpose of undergraduate admissions. All other subjects offered by different boards may be treated as non-elective.

1. Mass Media Studies will be treated as an academic subject for the purpose of admission to B.A. (Hons.) Journalism (Hindi/ English).
2. In case an applicant has studied elective and core languages, the core/ elective language subject will be treated as language, while elective language can be considered as academic/ music elective subject.
3. Admission to B.A. (Hons.) Applied Psychology will be based on -Best Four' percentage as in B.A. (Hons.) Psychology.
4. Admission to B.A. (Hons.) Social Work and B.A. (Hons.) Philosophy will be based on Best Four' percentage including one language and three academic/elective subjects as per the above procedure.
5. The applicants must have studied and passed Mathematics at the qualifying exam for admission to B.A. (Honours) in Economics.
6. (a) For admission to Honours in any language programme, advantage of 2% in the -Best Four' percentage will be given to those applicants who have studied that particular elective language.  
(b) In case, an applicant has not studied a language at qualifying exam and is seeking admission to Honours in that language (except for Honours in English and Hindi, refer (c)), deduction of 5% will be imposed on -Best Four' percentage.  
(c) For admission to Honours in English and Hindi, the applicant must have studied and passed the respective language in the qualifying exam and should include respective language for calculation of -Best Four' percentage.
7. University may define any other relevant subjects as an academic/ elective for a particular Honours programme.

#### **Example 1:**

If an applicant has scored: Accountancy (90), Business Studies (92), English Core (88) and Economics (94). Total marks in four subjects are  $90+92+88+94=364$ , Percentage is 91%.

#### **The effective percentage for:**

B.A. (Hons.) English is 91%, Not eligible for B.A. (Hons.) Economics, (Maths not studied passed)  
B.A. (Hons.) Political Science is  $91\% - 2.5\% = 88.5\%$ . (Political Science not studied & passed)

#### **Example 2:**

If an applicant has scored: Physics (96), Chemistry (92), English Core (90) and Mathematics (94), Economics (83).

**Case1:** Total marks in four subjects are  $96+92+90+94=372$ , Percentage is 93%. The effective percentage for:

B.A. (Hons.) History is  $93\% - 2.5\% = 90.5\%$ , B.A. (Hons.) English is 93%,

As economics is not considered in Best Four

**Case2:** Total marks in four subjects are  $96+90+94+83=363$ , Percentage is 90.75%. The effective percentage for:

B.A. (Hons.) Economics is 90.75%

**Comparing Case1 & Case2, Best Four for B.A. (Hons.) Economics is 90.75%**

#### **Example 3:**

If an applicant scored: Accounts (88), English Core (92), Punjabi Elective (90), Mathematics (82) and Web Designing (96).

Total marks in four subjects are  $88+92+90+96=366$ , Percentage is 91.5%.



The effective percentage for:

B.A. (Hons.) History is  $91.5\% - 2.5\% - 2.5\% = 86.5\%$

B.A. (Hons.) Punjabi is  $95\% + 2\% = 92.5\%$

B.A. (Hons.) English is  $90.5\% = 89\%$ .  $2.5\%$  is deducted as Web Designing not listed subject (List A).

**Example 4:**

If an applicant has scored: Accounts (90), Business Studies (92), English Core (88) and Home Science (94), Mathematics (85).

Total marks in four subjects are  $90+92+88+94=364$ , Percentage is  $91\%$ .

The effective percentage for B.A. (Hons.) Psychology is  $91 - 2.5 = 88.5\%$

The effective percentage for B.A. (Hons.) Economics is  $91 - 2.5 = 88.5\%$

The effective percentage for B.A. (Hons.) English is  $91\%$

**Example 5:**

If an applicant has scored: Physics (85), Chemistry (90), English Core (90), Biology (85) and Mathematics (75).

Total marks in Best four are:  $85+90+85+90=350$

The percentage is  $87.5\%$

The effective percentage for:

B.A. (Hons.) English is  $87.5\%$

B.A. (Hons.) Political Science is  $87.5\% - 2.5\% = 85\%$

B.A. (Hons.) Economics is  $87.5\% - 2.5\% = 85\%$

**Example 6:**

If an applicant has scored: English Elective (92), History (65), Political Science (85), Geography (89) and Home Science (90).

Total Marks in four subjects are  $92+85+89+90=356$ , excluding History.

The percentage is  $89\%$ . The effective percentage for:

B.A. (Hons.) English is  $89\% + 2\%$  (Elective) =  $91\%$

B.A. (Hons.) Political Science is  $89\%$

B.A. (Hons.) History is  $89 - 2.5\% = 86.5\%$  (History not included)

B.A. (Hons.) Psychology is  $89-2.5\% = 86.5\%$

**21 Procedure for calculation of 'Best Four' subjects percentage for B. Com. (Honours)/B.Com.:**

One Language from Part 1 of List C1 + three best subjects out of Part 2 of List C1.

**OR**

One Language from Part 1 of List C1 + any combination of subjects out of Part 2 of List C1, List C2 or any other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2). In such a case, the deduction of marks from aggregate percentage of 'Best Four' shall be as follows:

- iii. For every subject included from List C2, a deduction of one percent in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four';
- iv. For every other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2), a deduction of  $2.5\%$  per subject in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four'.

**Note:**

- 1. The applicant must have studied and passed Mathematics/Business Mathematics at the qualifying examination for admission to B. Com. (Hons.).

2. The computation of 'best four' subjects in the above framework should lead to an effective and unique -best four' which would be higher than any other combination of -best four' subjects.

The effective percentage is  $89.5\% - 2.5\% = 87\%$

**Case 2 is unique -best four-, so effective percentage for both B.Com. (Hons.) & B.Com. is 87%**

**Example 10:**

If an applicant has scored: Accountancy (90), Business Studies (92), English Core (88) and Home Science (94), Mathematics (85).

**Case 1:** Total marks are  $90+92+88+94=364$ , Percentage is 91%.

The effective percentage is  $91\% - 1\% = 90\%$

**Case 2:** Total marks are  $90+92+88+85=355$ , Percentage is 88.75%.

The effective percentage is 88.75%

**Case 1 is the -best four-, so effective percentage for both B.Com. (Hons.) & B.Com. is 90%**

**Example 11:**

If an applicant scored: History (88), English Core (92), Political Science (90), Philosophy (67) and Web Designing (96). Total marks are  $88+92+90+96=366$ , Percentage is 91.5%.

Not eligible for B.Com. (Hons.)

**II. Procedure for calculation of -Best Four' subjects percentage for B.A. programme:**

- a. One Language (Core/Elective/Functional)
- b. Any three elective subjects can be chosen. A deduction of upto 5% on -Best Four' percentage may be imposed if there is a change of stream for admission to B.A. programme, which means either from Commerce stream to or Science stream to Arts/Humanities/Social Sciences.
- c. One non-listed (LIST A of Annexure II) subject can be included in calculation of 'Best Four' without any deduction.
- d. For admission to B.A. (Vocational) only, related vocational subjects may be treated at par with academic/elective subjects and upto two vocational subjects, which are in relationship with the programme of study may be included for the calculation of -Best Four'.
- e. If an applicant opts for Modern Indian Language (MIL) (Except Hindi) as a subject, an advantage of up to 10% may be given in -Best Four' in those colleges where MIL is offered as a subject.

**Note:**

- i. The college will have to notify the actual deduction upto 5% for change of stream before hand by uploading on their website and intimating the same to the University.
- ii. If more than one non-listed subject is included for calculation of -Best Four', a deduction of 2.5% each in -Best Four' may be levied in addition to deduction due to change of stream, if any.

**Example 13:**

### Admission to Science Programmes

The Basis of Selection for Mathematical Sciences/Science/Interdisciplinary & Applied Sciences programmes is listed in Section 5.1.4 and Section 5.1.5. All the subjects to be included for Basis of Selection (PCM/PCB/PCMB) must have at least 70% theory component of examination. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only must be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of PCM/PCB etc.

**Example 17:**

If an applicant has scored: Physics 90 (theory 50, practical 40; max. marks theory 60, practical 40), Chemistry 91 (theory 52, practical 39; max. marks theory 60, practical 40), English (90) and Mathematics (95), Physical Education (92). Physics and Chemistry have 60% theory component and 40% practical marks.

Pro rata marks in physics = 88.33%

Pro rata marks in chemistry = 89.92%

Therefore, Total marks in PCM are:  $88.33+89.92+95=273.25=91.08\%$  and PCME are:  $88.3+89.92+95+90=363.25=90.81\%$ .

**Example 18:**

If an applicant has scored: Physics 88 (theory 45, IA 14, practical 29; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), Chemistry 92 (theory 48, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), English (90) and Biology 95 (theory 51, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30). Mathematics 92. Physics, Chemistry and Biology have less than 70% theory component and must be converted to 70:30.

For Physics, it is  $56.25+29=85.25$ ; For chemistry, it is  $60+30=90$ ; For biology, it is  $63.75+30=93.75$ . The PCB is 89.77%; PCM is 89.19%

## *Discipline & Attendance Rules*

1. Students are accountable for their conduct to the Principal of the College and are prohibited from doing anything, either inside or outside the College, which may amount to breach of repute, discipline or interference with the discipline and normal working of the College. Pending an enquiry into his/her conduct, the authorities have the right to suspend a student from the College.
2. Students should take proper care of College property and must not spoil or cause any damage to or tamper with furniture and fittings.
3. Names of students who indulge in acts of indiscipline in the university examination may be struck off from the College rolls.
4. Ragging in any form is banned. Any student found indulging in it would be guilty of gross indiscipline and an FIR will be filed against him/her with the police as per the decision of the Hon. Supreme Court. Any one found indulging in eve-teasing shall also be dealt with under ordinance XV-B & XV-C.
5. In the matter of attendance lectures and tutorials, the students of the College are governed by the rules and regulations of the University of Delhi including DU EC Resolution No. 138 dated 05-06-1975. No student is eligible for promotion to the next higher class or to take a University Examination unless he/she has attended two-third of the lectures, tutorials and preceptorial held separately.
6. All application for leave of absence due to sickness must be supported by a Medical Certificate and should reach the Principal not later than a week after the student returns to the College after his/her illness. This rule will be enforced strictly in giving benefit of attendance on medical ground.
7. The areas near the classrooms are marked as the Silence Zone. Therefore, students are advised not to loiter/ make noise in this zone. They are advised to utilize their free periods for creative activities such as visiting library, playing games etc.
8. An Identity Card is issued to each student at the time of admission. A student is not allowed to enter college premises without showing his/her identity card at the College gate. A student must carry his/her identity card while he/she is in the college premises. Duplicate identity card will be issued on payment of Rs. 100/- subject to report of loss to the College authorities.
8. **First year students CANNOT contest college student union election except for the post of DUSU councillors.**
9. All information is displayed on the student notice board. Hence, students are advised to read notices regularly. Ignorance of any notice will not be accepted as a plea or an excuse for any delay in any matter.
10. Suggestion Box has been provided on the ground floor near the library. Students are advised to make use of it.
11. Students are not permitted to receive or entertain visitors in the College. In case such visits are essential, prior permission of the principal is necessary.
12. Travel Concession Facility for visit to hometown is available for the students. They are advised to contact the Administrative Office in Room No. 1.
13. College has a bus pass verification centre. To avail this facility, students may contact the concerned staff during 10.00 A.M. to 1.00 P.M. on all working days.
14. **In case any student is found to be involved in any act of indiscipline or misbehaviour within the college premises, the college reserves the right to take appropriate action including rustication.**

## B.A. Program

The BA Programme is an inter-disciplinary course which provides students a comprehensive idea of different disciplines of humanities and social sciences. B.A. Programme course requires a student to offer a combination of discipline, language, foundation and application courses over six semesters.

### (i) Discipline Courses :

B.A. Programme Course requires a student to offer any two discipline courses in all six semesters. College offers following combinations of discipline courses and students can choose any one of these. Sections have been divided on the basis of subject combinations and medium of instruction.

Section A	—	Economics and Political Science OR Political Science and Sanskrit OR Sanskrit and History	Hindi Medium
Section B	—	History and Political Science	Hindi Medium
Section C	—	Office Management and Economics OR Office Management and Mathematics OR Office Management and History OR Office Management and Political Science	English Medium
Section D	—	Economics and Political Science OR Economics and History OR Economics and Mathematics OR History and Political Science OR Political Science and Mathematics	English Medium
Section E	—	History and Political Science	Hindi Medium

### (ii) Language Courses :

A student shall offer eight language papers over six semesters. Of these, 2 papers are to be in English and 2 papers are to be in Hindi/other Indian Languages.

(a) English – Compulsory in Semesters I, II, III and IV.

(b) Hindi/Modern Indian Language – Compulsory in Semester I, II, V and VI.

Note : Students who have studied English upto Class XII will opt for English A and those who have studied the subject up to Class X will opt for English B. Likewise, students who have studied Hindi up to class XII will opt for Hindi A and those who have studied it upto Class X will opt for Hindi B and those who have studied it upto Class VIII will opt for Hindi C.

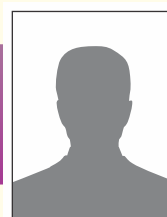

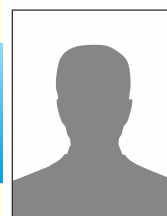
