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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

- Satyawati College established in 1972, recognized under Sections 2(f) &12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956 is a premier constituent college of the University of Delhi. Christened after the famous freedom fighter Satyawati Devi, the college began its illustrious journey from the humble environs of a government school building in Timarpur, Delhi. In 1986 it shifted to its present prominent location in Ashok Vihar, Phase-III, Delhi. Situated in close proximity to the North campus of University of Delhi the college campus inhabits a prime 10 acres' plot ensconced in eco-friendly, lush green landscape environs and adequate green areas to support sports pursuits.
- Satyawati College offers 11 undergraduate programs and 1 postgraduate program. The college strives to develop students' knowledge, creativity and cognitive potential. The college has several centers like Family Counseling Center (FCC), National Cadet Corps(NCC), National Service Scheme (NSS), Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) and other societies that work to enhance students' awareness and hone their latent potential to create academically developed, skilled and socially conscious human resources.
- All stakeholders of the college are guided by the code of professional ethics. Adhering to principles of integrity, dedication and accountability, they work unitedly to uphold the institution's policies and practices, and fulfill the vision and mission of the college.
- The built-in area of the college comprises classrooms, lecture theaters, computer and environmental studies laboratories, a well-stocked library, a state-of-the-art auditorium, seminar hall, a sports complex with gym, extensive playing grounds, medical room, girls common and utility rooms, disabled-friendly corridors, administrative offices and staff residences. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled and under CCTV surveillance.

- The college applies a student centric teaching learning process that aims at holistic and inclusive education for its students.
- The college aims at education for all, irrespective of caste, creed, gender, race, cultural identity, region, economics status and religion.
- In the spirit of 'Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat', we strive to create a multicultural, socially and linguistically diverse set of future ready, responsible, economically and socially productive citizens.
- The college aims to contribute to the objective of creating knowledge society by imparting knowledge to each and every student therefore aims at inclusive education. It is constantly working to improve the infrastructure and facilities for the students on the margins.

Mission

- The college aims to **effectively develop knowledge rich and skilled human resources** by invigorating

creative and analytical thinking, innovative ideas, leadership skills to face the challenges of the modern world with confidence. The college is working to improve the physical infrastructure of the college that is an essential part of training and skilling students with academic and soft skills.

- We are committed to providing a **learning platform for these skills** through additional/value added courses, collaborations with research organisations, extension activities in association with social sector organisations, and programmes related to gender equity, environment and ecological sustainability along with issues of topical relevance.
- We are increasing our focus and resources on the **adoption of technology** in formal modes of education, as well as dissemination of knowledge for an effective delivery of content. **ICT training** occupies center space in our mission of delivering a holistic and inclusive education for all.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The college aims at student centric education and delivers the curriculum through a well-defined and documented process. This is implemented by our dedicated faculty through provides mentoring and effective delivery of mandated curriculum that ensures academic excellence and holistic development of our students.
- Satyawati College, in consonance with national and global environmental concerns fosters an eco-friendly consciousness based on everyday environmental practices.
- The campus is disabled-friendly with ramps, tactile floors, manned lifts, specially designed washrooms, walking aids, wheel-chairs and dedicated parking. PWD students are charged nominal fees along with laptops, Angel PRO devices and Braille books. Help the Blind foundation provides funds for visually challenged students' tuition fee as well as organise skill enhancement certificate programs like English communication and computer learning.
- The college's state-of-the-art auditorium is among the best in the University.
- Gender initiatives by FCC, NSS, NCC (2Girls Battalion) and NCC (Naval unit) seek to **empower girl** students and create awareness about gender equity. A 'zero-tolerance policy' is followed towards issues of sexual harassment and enforced through Internal Complaints Committee (ICC).
- The college library is well-stocked, linked with N-LIST through INFLIBNET, having access to National Digital Library (NDL) and Delhi University Library Systems (DULS). Air-conditioned reading halls, computer cabins, and information kiosks (OPAC) provide a conducive environment for study.
- Satyawati College's well placed alumni in industry, universities, government sectors, corporate world and the wider community provides inspiration to current generation of students, and renders immeasurable support to the institution in defining future goals. One of the notable *Alumni, Dhanajay Joshi is a Vice Chancellor of Delhi Teachers Training University and Mr Avdhesh Mishra is a founder and Member GB, NorthCap University.*
- The college faculty constantly upgrades itself through training programs, courses, FDPs, participation in

conferences and is engaged in major research projects with esteemed organizations. Teachers use ICT enabled tools for an effective teaching-learning process.

- The college practices close interaction with its stakeholders and engages in a dialogic process through an efficient system of *collecting feedback, mentor - mentee mechanism* and counseling sessions. The mentor-mentee groups establish a close connection with the students.

Institutional Weakness

- For sustained growth and development, the institution requires an increase in the number of permanent teaching staff.
- Satyawati College is currently pursuing only one postgraduate program. An increase in postgraduate programs would enhance academic competencies.
- Financial resources are very limited for expansion and upgradation of campus facilities and growing academic needs.

Institutional Opportunity

- Satyawati College attracts students from all over India and beyond; our students come from remote places as far as North Eastern states of India as well as from African countries. Due to application of technology in education and online sources, digitization of libraries, the students are benefitted.
- Teachers are employing ICT in teaching and assessment. The pandemic provided the teachers exposure to different online platforms like Google Classrooms, WhatsApp groups.
- Covid 19 induced lockdown also provided an opportunity to conduct webinars and online lectures inviting best minds from India and abroad, with low additional financial burden.
- The college can collaborate with universities in India and abroad for multidisciplinary exchange programmes for students and faculty by making optimum use of the college's extensive network with academicians and practitioners.
- Strengthening of existing community outreach activities with government and non-government organizations.
- Associating with national and international partners for conducting research projects, seminars, workshops, conferences, add-on courses and certificate courses to strengthen the existing pool of knowledge.
- Internship and Placement opportunities have enhanced the scope for creation of networking links between the students and corporate sector.
- The goodwill and credibility created through a robust engagement with the industry by the college's Placement Cell and internships of various departments offers immense scope for strengthening future entrepreneurial activities.
- Encouraging faculty to publish in reputed SCOPUS indexed and UG listed journals.
- The illustrious alumni contribute to the college by sharing their experience, inspire students and also help financially for development of college infrastructure.

- Satyawati College provides a holistic education to students who are nurtured in the best traditions so that they can bring about transformations in society in consonance with the vision and mission of their alma-mater.

Institutional Challenge

- The institution faces several challenges to enhance the infrastructure to achieve its mission.
- Raising budgetary support for pursuing research projects and to offer add-on courses.
- Scarcity of sponsoring/ funding agencies to support students up /projects.
- Getting funds from ICCSR and UGC for organizing seminars and conferences is becoming difficult.
- UGC funds remain insufficient to renovate and develop physical infrastructure.
- Satyawati College is committed to environmental protection and has successfully implemented several eco-friendly initiatives and practices, but budgetary constraints are a constant challenge for the upkeep and upgradation of equipment for waste management.
- Satyawati College is a preferred choice of PWD students evinced by the consistently large number of such students on campus. Enhancing physical infrastructure facilities and dedicated assistance devices for them requires greater financial support.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As a constituent college of University of Delhi, Satyawati College follows the **centrally designed curriculum notified by the university departments** duly passed by the Academic Council. Timely delivery of the curriculum is ensured through a well-planned mechanism.

- **Department academic calendars** and course allocations are done before the commencement of each semester to ensure proper preparation by concerned faculty members.
- Attempts are made to incorporate the latest developments in each field through **optional papers** offered by different departments so that learners gain a holistic perspective. Issues pertaining to gender sensitisation, disability and caste and environmental awareness are highlighted through papers like Literature and Caste, Women, Power and Politics, Environmental Economics, Understanding Ambedkar, Literature and Disability, which enable learners to be connected to their actual world. Women Empowerment is the need of the hour and the college promotes this in every possible manner. The interdisciplinary approach of the diverse optional papers offered inculcates moral and ethical values among the learners.
- **Curriculum enrichment** is enabled by the participation of faculty members in syllabus revision exercises conducted periodically by the university departments. Their inputs contribute to syllabus and assessment modifications.
- The different dimensions of an **enabling and empowering education** include classroom learning as well as experiential knowledge. While classroom presentations and discussions contribute to participative learning, visits to museums, industries and relevant field trips expand the learner's knowledge horizons.
- The **mentoring scheme and remedial classes** ensure that all students can benefit from the counseling services of their peers and teachers. A robust feedback mechanism is in place to help improve the delivery mechanisms.

- Students are encouraged to use the **library and online resources** to supplement their knowledge and inspire their research aptitude. The library and reading rooms provide a calm and peaceful environment to this end.
- Faculty members are also encouraged to keep themselves updated regarding latest developments in their respective disciplines and engage themselves in research activities and this directly benefits both teachers and learners.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Satyawati College is a learners- centric institution, aiming to educate and empower all students with diverse interests and capabilities.

- A learner-centered and *innovative pedagogical approach* ensures maximum benefit to students. Faculty members share additional reading materials with students while also encouraging them to develop an independent research aptitude. Class presentations and participation in practical and creative activities boost students' confidence to be empowered.
- Faculty members are encouraged to use *ICT tools and participate in FDPs* to keep abreast of the dynamic pedagogical needs.
- Students are also encouraged to use the physical and *online library resources* to supplement their classroom learning. The college library is connected with N-List (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure) and has access to more than 6000 journals and 1,99,500 ebooks. The college is also connected to the DULS (Delhi University Library System).
- Different and *innovative pedagogical approaches* are used to address the different learning aptitudes of students. As all students are not the same, the fast learners are encouraged to engage in research projects and apply for internships and innovative projects. The academically weaker students are paid more attention through the Remedial classes and mentoring system which ensures a personal rapport with their teachers.
- **Assessment and evaluation parameters** are notified by the concerned university departments. Internal assessment is conducted in the college through individual and group class presentations, surprise tests, quizzes, assignments and class tests. The Internal Assessment records are shared with students and feedback is provided regarding their performance. If necessary, they are given an opportunity to improve their performance.
- Students' aptitudes and career objectives are also kept in mind. Add-on and foreign language courses offered by the college allow them to tap their wider interests, and through the activities of Saksham, the Career Counseling and Placement Cell, students are advised and prepared through mock interviews and talks. They benefit concretely through campus recruitment drives. Seminars are also organized to expose them to diverse occupational opportunities so that they can become employment-generators as well as employment-seekers.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Satyawati College actively promotes a dedicated research environment among both faculty members and students.

- The **faculty members constantly enhance their academic profile** by attending Refresher Courses,

Faculty Development Programs, seminars and conferences. They publish regularly in prestigious journals and other publications. An IQAC initiative recommended reimbursement of fees incurred by participants through the Research Committee and IQAC itself organized FDPs, seminars, encouraged faculties to take up projects and has instituted a Research Excellence Many faculty members have also been recipients of the College Lecturer Award, Delhi Govt.

- **Students' research aptitude** and activities are also encouraged through class presentations, internships, field trips and project works. **Collaborative activities** with different organizations also facilitate the skill enhancement opportunities for students.
- Students are involved in various **extension activities** in the college and neighborhood which promotes a sense of discipline, responsibility and makes students more creative. Under the aegis of NCC and NSS, Blood-donation camps, Cleanliness drives in college and neighborhood, tree planting activity contribute to an empathetic and sustainable Ecosystem.
- During the Covid19 pandemic, distribution of Covid relief materials and food packages was much appreciated by those in distress. One NCC cadet Divyanshi Sharma was recognised as a Covid hero for her humanitarian activities and her efforts appreciated in the Prime Minister's '*Mann ki Baat*'. Bhumika Chabra and Divyansh Rana also earned laurels through their involvement with the NGOs Khushiyon ki Umang and Shikshit Deshbhakti Foundation.
- The **Bio-Remediation project** undertaken in Najafgarh Drain by some faculty members and thirty students is also a good example of extension activities undertaken by the college to contribute proactively to community well-being. Students also enthusiastically registered for the '**Nadi Ko Jano**' initiative, undertaken to connect with cultural importance of the water resources in a nationwide integrated program. Moreover, the college has registered under '**Unnat Bharat Abhiyan**' and adopted five villages.
- The college celebrates several days like independence day, anticorruption day, Human Rights day, International women's day, Teacher's day etc to enhance social values and national pride among students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Satyawati College moved to the present 10 acre campus in Ashok Vihar in 1986 and since then has incrementally expanded its infrastructure to accommodate the growing and diverse needs of the institution.

- The college building is demarcated into **Old and New buildings** and the entire space is utilized by both morning and evening colleges. The entire infrastructure is shared by these two different colleges operating in shifts. Two big lecture theaters supplement the regular classrooms. Two computer labs, Library, seminar and committee rooms, smart class rooms, designated rooms for NCC, NSS, Dramatics, Arts and Culture, Photography among other facilitate the overall development. The college is one of the few institutions in DU to have a state-of-the-art Environment Science lab equipped with the latest instruments and aligned to latest research activities.
- All **departments have dedicated rooms** equipped with air-conditioners, computers and printers. Dedicated rooms are also allotted to certain bodies like FCC (Family Counseling Center), EOC (Equal Opportunities Cell), for inclusive education.
- The college also has a **medical room** with a doctor and nurse to cope with primary medical requirements.
- The **seminar room** is Wi-fi enabled and equipped with a projector to host many academic events like

seminars, conferences and invited lectures. The **K P Bhatt Satya auditorium** is one of the finest in DU with a seating capacity of 1000 and also facilitates many academic and cultural events.

- **Library** is the academic heart of the institution. Currently under renovation and upgradation, it offers students a diverse range of reading materials. Students can also access a vast mine of information through the online connection with the National Digital Library. They can consult online resources at N-List and **DULS (Delhi University Library System)**. The reading hall, availability of old question papers and photocopy facilities add to the students' convenience and motivation.
- The college has an extensive **sports ground** which enables various sporting events to be organized, including an annual cricket tournament in which many teams of Delhi University participate. Basketball, volleyball and badminton courts and a grass athletic track encourages students' maximum participation.

Student Support and Progression

- Students benefit from many **National scholarship schemes** as well as the Satyawati College Student Aid Fund. They get incentives like medals and awards through the various memorial prizes instituted by various faculty members.
- Some students contributing to creative activities and competitions are given relaxations in attendance, etc. The students from economically weaker sections are given **fee concessions** at the time of admission.
- The **Students Union** acts as a link between students and administration by conveying students' concerns to the administration. They also organize academic and cultural programs for students' benefit.
- The students' concerns are also addressed by different committees like the Students Advisory Committee, Internal Complaints Committee, Family Counseling Cell and the Proctorial Committee. The college follows a strict policy of zero tolerance of sexual harassment, ragging and other intimidatory practices and ensures a prompt redressal of grievances.
- The students are also guided by **Saksham**, the **Career Counseling and Placement Cell** of the college, regarding development of soft skills, career options and campus placements. Every year several companies like **ICICI, GenPact, IBM, EnY** etc visit college for campus placements. They organize relevant talks and seminars by achievers in different fields including guidance for resume writing, communication skills, tips for competitive exams. MOUs with different organizations like **Center for Global Studies and Comparative Federalism Research Group** expose students to wider field work and research skills enhancement. Many of our students have progressed to acquiring higher educational degrees in India and abroad while many have got good placements in reputed organizations.
- The **Alumni Association** plays an important role in inspiring students as some of our notable alumni act as their role models. The college has a registered Alumni Association and many distinguished alumni like Dhanajay Joshi, Vice Chancellor, Col Vinod, Mr. Avdhesh Mishra founder and Member GB, NorthCap University are contributing to the development of the college. Mr Avdhesh Mishra has sponsored (**Contributed Rs 15 lakhs**) the face uplift of the reception area of the college. The college has recently created a Wall of Pride that acknowledges the distinguished alumni.

Governance, Leadership and Management

For effective governance and administration, the Principal, Governing Body, Financial staff and administrative staff work in close coordination for the development of the college.

- **Principal** is the head of the institution who devises strategies and planning to navigate and drive the institution to achieve its vision and mission within the framework of university rules and ordinances. The **Governing Body** takes various administrative and procedural decisions after getting relevant inputs from the Principal.
- The college **administration** promotes participative and decentralized functioning through Department In-charges and constitution of various committees which work in close coordination with the Principal.
- The college encourages **innovation and student friendly initiatives**. Priding itself on being a learner-centric institution, Satyawati College encourages students to take the lead in organizing different events in their departments and committees under the guidance from faculty members.
- Different **welfare schemes like medical** facilities and different kinds of leaves as mandated by the university are available for both teaching and non-teaching staff. The administration is empathetic and efficient towards different needs of its employees.
- Regular **internal and external financial audits** are carried out to monitor the financial health of the institution. Statutory external audit and assessment of Income-Expenditure and Receipt Payment is also done by CAG and Govt. of NCT. The college is proud of its sound financial practices which include timely disbursement of salaries and other financial requirements of its employees. The location of a PNB branch, canteen and photocopier corner on the college premises is conducive for both revenue generation as well as a convenience for the college employees.
- The **IQAC** of the college works for the overall development of the college. It seeks to entrench the best practices for the multidimensional growth of all stakeholders. To that end IQAC has recommended many infrastructural improvements, renovations and developments of the infrastructural facilities. It has given full importance to the research activities of the faculty members by organizing FDPs, seminars and webinars during the pandemic also. Skill enhancement seminars have been organized for both non-teaching staff and students who have benefited from add-on courses and seminars.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Satyawati College fosters a culture of gender equity, social inclusiveness and ecological consciousness. It sensitizes students and employees about constitutional obligations and responsibilities as citizens. Its distinctiveness is its research initiatives and imparting of a holistic and inclusive education. The two best practices implemented by the college are an Eco-Friendly Campus and inclusive education.

Eco- Friendly Campus:

- An eco-friendly campus is a major priority with Satyawati College. Its policies are designed keeping in mind Green India Mission, Swachh Bharat Mission 2.0, India's Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and 'net zero' carbon emissions by 2070.
- The college is registered with MSTC. Autoclave machines and bacteriological incubators discard microbes and infection-causing agents. No radioactive waste is generated in the college, and biodegradable and E-waste is efficiently managed. Rainwater harvesting, solar panels, LED, CFL and sensor-based lighting, pollution monitoring station, cleanliness and plantation drives, herbal garden, environment awareness campaigns by NSS, NCC and Environmental Studies department society, *Prakriti* ensure a green campus.

Inclusive Education:

- Satyawati College is the preferred choice of PWD students evinced by the large numbers admitted every year. The Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) ensures equal opportunity in academic and extracurricular activities for the disabled.
- Gender sensitisation initiatives include FCC's gender awareness programs and counseling; NCC's (2 Delhi Girls Battalion) training of girl cadets in civil defense, participation in social outreach programs like Clean India Rally and blood donation camps. NCC (Naval Unit) strengthens them physically and mentally.
- The demographic profile of the college is multicultural and cultural, regional, linguistic and socio-economic inclusivity is promoted through programs of Arts and Culture Society, Foreign Students' Advisory Committee, North East Society, SC/ST Committee, Equal Opportunity Society and Debating Society.
- The college magazine reflects linguistic diversity with sections in English, Hindi, Sanskrit and Urdu.
- Socio-economic parity is ensured through fee waivers and concessions to SC/ST, PWD, OBC students and financial assistance by Directorate of Education and UGC. The Equal Opportunity Cell promotes social inclusion.
- Satyawati College is also constantly encouraging its faculties to excel in the field of research and explore innovative pedagogies for teaching learning process.

Satyawati College follows the curriculum and academic calendar that is mandated by University of Delhi.

- At the start of the academic year, **various optional papers**, generic and discipline specific electives offered by each department are systematically displayed in the prospectus for incoming students’.
- The **Timetable Committee** prepares the master timetable, in consultation with all departments, and subsequently displays the integrated timetable on the college website. The college also has provision for remedial classes, add-on courses and mentoring sessions.
- Every academic year begins with a general **orientation program** to welcome all students. Every department and society plans its calendar to draw workload, paper distribution and extra-curricular activities.
- An **effective and timely delivery of curriculum** is executed through classes, practicals, tutorials, assignments, projects, powerpoint presentations, documentary films related to subjects, internships, seminar, webinar, quiz, debates, competitions educational trips, field work, remedial classes add-on courses.
- This is aided by **physical and IT infrastructure**-two well equipped computer laboratories, smart boards and Wi-Fi enabled campus. During the pandemic, the college introduced several educational tools like google classroom, google meets, MS teams, zoom, WhatsApp groups and YouTube so that no student is left behind.
- The college attempts to make education holistic and inclusive for differently abled students, by providing them with **recorders (angels) and laptops**.
- The departments are encouraged to offer **add-on courses** to broaden students’ horizons and make them more competitive for better career opportunities.
- The college offers **certificate and diploma courses** in German and French languages.
- The College has **collaborations and MOUs** with several research organizations for value addition.
- Our **faculty participates in FDPs** to keep themselves abreast of current pedagogical developments and procedures of assessment and evaluation.
- Our teaching-learning process is **student centric** with mentor mentees system, tutorials, counseling, informal interactions and feedback mechanism.
- An **online feedback system** seeks opinions of students and faculty members to improve the systems, which is assessed by IQAC for follow-up and action.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

The success of any student learning process is pivoted on **continuous and engaging participation of the students** within and outside the classroom teaching. At Satyawati College, the faculty play the role of a mentor, that goes beyond plain teaching, guiding and shaping their futures. The activities for students are based on a constructive dialogue with them.

- The students are taken on **tours beyond the college campus** for an experiential learning- industrial trips (Department of Commerce), field visits (Department of Economics), extension activities related to environment (Department of Environmental Studies), museum and archives visits (Department of History).
- The faculty strives for enrichment of learning experience of the students through **interactive classes** with quizzes, presentations, debates, discussions and informal interactions.
- Faculty mould content and methodology in line with the different learning abilities of students, using PowerPoint presentations, audiovisuals, YouTube and other online sources.
- To inculcate a **problem solving mindset**, societies and departments organize talks, seminars and sessions.
- The various departments attempt to offer a diverse range of **skill enhancement courses (SEC)** under CBCS/LOCF scheme, that balance the academically rigorous courses for a balanced and enhanced learning.

Satyawati College provides ICT enabled environment for facilitating attainment of program

outcomes and course outcomes that involves Wi-Fi connection, computer labs, smart boards, and online platform for knowledge dissemination.

- The two **computer laboratories** are equipped with desktop computers for teaching computer-based papers and conducting practical. Laptops are provided to first year students and all PWD students. The computer laboratories, seminar rooms and smart rooms are equipped with projectors and internet facilities.
- The College has 100 MBPS fiber broadband line from Delhi University through National Knowledge Network (NKN). This makes our college a **Wi-Fi enabled campus** freely accessible to students and faculty through the username and password provided to them.
- The college provides various **computer softwares** such as Mathematica, Latex R, MS Excel, SPSS, Grelt, Tally for effective teaching and learning.
- The college library is connected to N-LIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure) and National Digital Library (NDL). The students are equipped with an **institutional email** identity to allow access to the e-journals and e-books available on these platforms.
- **ICT tools** Zoom, Google Classroom, Google Meets, Microsoft Teams have been used for online classes, webinars, conferences and workshops. Some of these are streamed live on YouTube for better reach and access of participants. (https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCC-f8OFgBw-77DnArJ_CcA?app=desktop). These platforms are also being used for assignments, tests and projects, as revealed in the Google form survey filled by the faculty.
- The faculty found greater use of social media apps and platforms that include **WhatsApp, Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn and Telegram** to connect with the students, especially during pandemic.
- Faculty members have contributed in creating **e-resources for students**.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The mechanism for internal assessment is stipulated by the University of Delhi and we strive to maintain **transparency and robustness** in this mechanism.

- As per rules, internal assessment accounts for 25% marks and the remaining 75% are based on external assessment conducted through university level examination.
- The **internal assessment** has two components - attendance (5%) on the basis of percentage of classes attended, and the remaining (20%) is based on tests/assignments/project work/presentation/quizzes, which differs across papers and courses, as mandated by the subject wise guidelines provided by the University. The students are given opportunity to improve by continuous feedback by the faculties about their performance.
- The college adopts a **decentralized mechanism of submission of internal assessment** in a standard format which is moderated at the department level. After this, the assessment records are then sent for second round of moderation to the Internal Assessment Moderation Committee. This committee oversees the records for any gaps, inconsistencies or incompleteness. Before sending the records to the University, they are shared with the students and any grievances reported by students are duly noted and resolved, making the process robust and participative for each stakeholder-faculty, administration and students.

- The process of collating **assessment records of all faculty was made completely online** by creating institutional email addresses and getting the assistance of liaison officers in smooth functioning of the entire process.

Satyawati College endeavors to ensure transparency, regularity and efficiency in its administrative efforts towards resolution of any internal assessment grievance. It has an efficient mechanism to deal with any such grievance and assists students in its resolution in a decentralized manner.

- There is a **continuous dialogue** with the students where they are apprised of the modes of assessment and its frequency.
- Answer scripts, assignments, projects and other submissions towards internal assessments are discussed by teachers to the students' satisfaction. Students are allowed to reappear for a test for valid reasons.
- Before submitting the Internal Assessment of students to the **Departmental Moderation Committee**, faculty members share the records with the students to avoid discrepancies, if any and to maintain overall transparency.
- At the administrative level, the department wise internal assessment records are moderated by the **Moderation Committee** which works in a transparent and objective manner to check the internal assessment records for any inadvertent mistakes.
- The students are given **another opportunity for redressal** after this second round of moderation at the college level, before the records are sent to the University. The internal assessment records are uploaded on the college website and notices regarding are prominently displayed physically and on the college website. Students are notified to check their internal assessment scores for any mistakes. The whole process is done remotely using a dedicated email(ia@satyawati.du.ac.in), and/or google form.
- The college **coordinates with the Examination Branch** of the University for resolution of external assessment grievances This became more important during the pandemic period. The College publically displayed contact details of dedicated staff for students' convenience. A Nodal Officer for OBE was appointed.

Satyawati College fosters an **environment for skill development and knowledge enhancement** within the canvas of programme outcomes mandated by the University of Delhi. The college offers Undergraduate Honors courses in English, Hindi, Sanskrit, Urdu, Commerce, Economics, Political Science, History and Mathematics, B Com(program), BA (program) while it registers post graduate students in Political Science.

- The student can readily reference the course syllabi through the college website.(<https://www.satyawaticollege.ac.in/syllabus>). The college also circulates a google form for optional courses.
- Once a student gets admitted to the college, the first few interactions are geared to initiate her/him to **introduce the course and its scope and outcomes** through the orientation programs organized at departmental and college level.
- The **faculty members assimilate course outcomes** in their regular teaching processes as they share the course details, readings and course content with students throughout the semester continuously.
- Each of the programmes have their own outcomes, and each course within a programme is more specific in terms of the outcomes it seeks to deliver. The faculty of the college assess the attainment of these outcomes through **formal and informal assessments** as per University of Delhi rules.
- A formal assessment that constitutes 25% of grades is done through **presentations, quizzes, practicals and viva, individual and group assignments** to directly measure programme and course outcomes.
- On the Annual Day, star performers in academic and non-academic categories are honored with **prizes and scholarships**.
- The **faculty adheres to the suggested teaching learning processes** in the subject wise syllabus of the program/course structures to encourage in depth understanding of concepts, expression of their understanding through written assignments, along with development of critical thinking skills, research skills, scientific temperament, digital literacy, and problem solving techniques.
- The **programs and activities conducted by different societies** inculcate and reinforce key outcomes ‘soft’ skills team building, communication skills, multicultural competencies, ethics’ awareness which are critical and imperative to transform young minds into ‘life-long’ learners.
- The **extension activities under NCC, NSS** provide an opportunity to test students’ understanding of societal issues and develop an inquiry based approach to deal with them effectively using academic principles.
- As an institute of higher education, the success of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes is best evaluated by creating **well rounded personalities that excel professionally and are socially productive**.
- Students are motivated to pursue higher studies and many of them follow through, both in India and abroad. While some students pursue discipline-centered courses, others pursue specialized or professional courses.
- The **Placement Cell(SAKSHAM)** consistently conducts placement and internship drives under the INNOVISION umbrella which helps students to obtain employment at various reputed companies. It also conducts workshops for personality development, preparing their CVs and appearing in interviews.
- Our **alumni** have earned distinctions in various fields such as art, academia, law and administration. The Alumni Commttee invites its distinguished alumni to inspire current students. Some important endeavours in this direction are:

- Saksham, the career counselling and placement cell organizes **INNOVISION**- an internship and education fair annually since 2016. Underlying a vision for innovation and entrepreneurship, this fair provides a platform to our students to interact with reputed universities and companies for meaningful engagements.
- **Parth Sehgal and Sanchi Dilavari** won the third prize for their paper- - India and COP26: Opportunities and Threats in the **National Young Economist Conclave 2022**.
- This paper was also published in the prestigious **Hindu College's Annual Research Journal 'Pramaanam' 2022**.
- Suhani Silki ,Riya Ratan, Bipul Kumar wrote a paper - on **Mathematical Analysis of Covid 19** and testing capacity using SIQ(S) Model, which was published in the **SRCC student journal, Artha in 2022**

- The **Bio-Remediation project** carried out by a team of three faculty members and 30 volunteers in the Najafgarh drain showed encouraging results in increasing the levels of dissolved oxygen after bio-remediation sessions.
- The college in collaboration with Teaching Learning Centre, Ramanujan college organised an online refresher course on MOOCs and an **FDP on Meaningful Research and Intellectual Property Rights**.

Satyawati college strives to create a **vibrant academic environment**.

The college conducts **national and international conference**, faculty workshops and seminars in collaboration with **UGC, ICSSR, ICSS, ICPR, Raza Foundation, Centre for Global Studies and Comparative Federation Research Group**. These academic interactions act as a conduit for the creation and dissemination of knowledge. In the wake Covid-19 pandemic, our college organised Teaching Learning workshops on MS Teams and use of ICT techniques for preparing our faculty for online teaching.

- The faculty research projects ranging from scientific topics (**Effect of ionising electromagnetic radiation emitted from cell phones**) to social issues (**The idea of reliance and understanding its impact in improving socio-economic conditions of migrant labourers**) testify to the fertile academic ecosystem of Satyawati College facilitating creation of innovative researchers.

Satyawati College aims to contribute to society by grooming global and socially productive, empathetic and progressive citizens. Its physical infrastructure supports this vision by providing ample opportunities for the same.

It has a **sprawling campus of 10 acres** with an aesthetically appealing landscaped ground and modern infrastructure and facilities for teaching learning process.

- The college has **two buildings** interconnected with lifts: Old Building and New Building, with classrooms, digitized library, computer labs, environment labs, seminar rooms, auditorium, departmental /tutorial rooms, NCC, NSS and FCC rooms, society rooms, girls and boys common rooms, staff room, medical room, bank facility, photocopy booth, sports complex and canteen facilities.
- The college is Wi-Fi enabled across **58 classrooms, 4 smart classrooms** equipped with smart interactive boards and projectors, and two computer labs.
- The college has 126 desktops for students and 420 laptops, and recording devices for visually handicapped students.
- The college has a **modern auditorium** that can seat more than 800 students, that is used for the academic and creative activities.
- **The college library** is well endowed with 78,081 books, 22 magazines, 25 newspapers and 43,286 e-journals (accessed through DULS). It has an air conditioned student reading hall and a smart faculty/reading room. It has a separate reading cabin for differently-abled students equipped with JAWS.
- **Environmental Science laboratories** in the new building are equipped with - Laminar Hood, CO2 incubators, Water bath, ELISA Reader, BOD, Autoclave, Electrophoresis unit, Microscopes: Inverted and Upright fluorescent microscopes, PH meter, Hot Air Oven, Bacteriological Incubator, PCR machine, Non-ionizing Radiation exposure system setup, Liquid nitrogen tanks, refrigerated centrifuge, -800 Deep freezer, Spectrophotometer, UV-, K, Ice-flaking Machine used for teaching and research purposes.
- The college has installed **two generators** of capacity of 250 KVA and 160 KVA to provide uninterrupted conduct of classes and students' activities.

Outdoor sports facilities:

- Cricket field with mat pitch and cemented practice pitch.
- Football field.
- Basketball court.
- Volleyball court.
- Kho-Kho ground.
- Two Badminton courts.

- 200m grass athletic track.

- The **Seminar room** is equipped with a LCD monitor to facilitate lectures, conferences, workshops and movie-screening for 100 participants.
- The college has **allotted rooms exclusively for several activities** related to arts and culture, photography and dramatics to promote creative and artistic skills amongst students.

The college has a **well-equipped library** to cater to the academic pursuits of students for a conducive teaching learning process.

- The college library has 78,081 books and subscribes to 22 print magazines, 25 print newspapers and 43,286 e-journals (accessed through DULS), as of date.
- The library provides access to 6000 plus e-journals and 1,64,300 plus e-books on <https://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in/>, 6,00,000 e-books on National Digital Library, and many more on www.du.ac.in portals.
- It has an air-conditioned reading hall (seating capacity of more than 100 students), smart meeting/reading room for faculty, netsurfing space for students. All the books are barcoded and are digitally cataloged and circulated with the convenience of single screen Issue, Return and Renewal.
- The library has a separate section where multiple textbooks are stacked for the convenient access of students.
- The college has a reference section comprising of a large number of reference books, encyclopedia, journals and dictionaries to augment the teaching-learning process.
- The library is equipped with an Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC) facility to help users in searching text books, journals, periodicals etc. The Library Notice Board keeps the users informed and updated.
- The new arrivals are prominently placed on the Display stand.
- The question papers of previous years are collected, systematically arranged according to course and semester and bound for ready reference.
- Photocopy facility is available inside the library.
- The library is equipped with URKUND software to check plagiarism in research.

The following facilities are offered to the differently –abled students by the library

- A separate reading cabin for differently-abled students.
- Six computers are available for searching, downloading and other uses.
- Audio CDs, Angel recorders (Talking Digital Portable Daisy Player) and Braille books are available.
- The library staff is very cooperative and assistance is provided to the differently abled students on a priority basis.

Library Automation and library footfall data

- Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) with NETTLIB, since 2003.
- The library has subscription to e-journals, e-Shodh Sindhu, Shodhganga Membership, e-books and databases through DULS.
- Average annual expenditure in year 2021-22 on purchase of book was Rs. 649495. A total of 1102 books were purchased and total expenditure on purchase of journals were Rs 22824. An additional eight journals are now subscribed that pertain to specific subjects like Economics.
- The library usage in terms of daily footfall in the year 2021-22 was 7.3%. The physical footfall has been hampered by the pandemic and the transition to online teaching, as many students continue to

frequently visit and even reside in their native place of residence and are unable to use the library in physical mode.

The Principal is the head of the institution who devises strategies and planning to navigate and drive the institution to achieve its vision and mission within the framework of university rules and ordinances. The Principal acts closely with the Governing body to promote the interest of the college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc

Response:

- The **Organogram** of Satyawati College reflects democratic governance with shared responsibilities. The organizational structure of the College consists of the Governing Body, Principal, the Teaching Staff, the Non-Teaching Staff.
- The **Governing Body** looks after the overall supervision of administration and regulation of finance. In this endeavour **Bursar** appointed by the Governing Body helps manage internal finance, financial audit and better utilization of funds.
- **Principal** is the head of the institution, who is also the ex-officio chairperson of the IQAC and Staff Council. The Principal works in coordination with the Administrative Officer, Section Officers (one for the Accounts Office and one for the General Administration), Teacher-in-Charge (TIC) of the Departments and various convenors of the societies for the development of the college.
- **Staff Council** is a statutory body that takes decisions as per ordinance XVIII for the smooth functioning of the academic and co-curricular activities of the college.
- **Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)** is constituted as per UGC Norms in order to work towards the overall quality assurance and enhancement including academics and physical infrastructure.

The college's Strategic /perspective plan is designed in line with its vision and mission.

- The college has successfully integrated information and communication technology (ICT) based pedagogy in the teaching learning process and administration.
- Training sessions on **Google Classroom** and Microsoft Teams were organised to endow teachers with technical skills to manage teaching in online mode.
- The college has successfully conducted a two-week interdisciplinary refresher course on '**Managing Online classes and co-creating MOOCs**' in collaboration with **Ramanujan College**, University of Delhi under the aegis of Pandit Madan Mohan Malviya National Mission on Teachers and Teaching (PMMMNTT), Ministry of Education.
- The college has subscribed to **NLIST** to provide millions of e-resources to its faculty and students free of cost, through its affiliation with Delhi University Library System(DULS). For this purpose, a separate institutional email IDs has been provided to students and faculty, which facilitates login to NLIST database, and fosters a research environment in college.
- The college subscribes to the **ERP system** which has facilitated easy access to information regarding monthly pay slips, leave status, and the uploading of lessons by faculty members. The administration employs e-forums such as the Government e-Marketplace (GeM) and the associated Tally software. The Public Financial Management System, or PFMS, is another e-resources used by accounts section.
- In terms of physical infrastructure, the '**Dr. MK Haldar Memorial Library**' named after our first Principal, has been digitalized, and the online version is now fully operational.
- Moreover, several renovation and development works have been undertaken by IQAC such as installation of Pink Booth (outside college), renovation of toilets, Girls Common Room, installation of CCTVs, renovation of auditorium, replacement of chairs in seminar room. Office Record room and Add-on courses room have been created. Alumni Wall has been created to inspire the students.
- An efficient leased line has been deployed to increase the bandwidth of internet connection in college premises.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching

and non-teaching staff**Response:**

Satyawati College follows several policies for the welfare and Performance Appraisal System e of teaching and non-teaching staff.

Welfare measures-The first and foremost is the different kinds of leaves granted to teaching and non-teaching staff as per University of Delhi rules.

- Financial Assistance: Staff Association has been actively involved in welfare/financial assistance and during Covid-19 period granted approximately 10 lakhs to needy staff members.
- Health and Hygiene: The College has installed about 30 hand sanitizer dispensers and purchased disinfectant spray machines during Covid pandemic.
- Medical Facilities: Medical rooms with the Doctor and Nurse are equipped with medicine and first Aid facilities for the convenience of Staff.
- Health and Wellness Facilities: The College also organized health and wellness camps for free checkups for different stakeholder of the College
- Family Counseling Center: The Family Counseling Center has a Counselor to deal with the emotional challenges faced by the staff.
- Physical Fitness: The Sports department has created a Gym with modern equipment and a trainer for the physical fitness of students and staff. The health and wellness programs like Yoga/Meditation sessions and several sports events are organized from time to time for the staff.
- Disabled Friendly Campus: The College has ramps/slopes, tactile paths, lifts, handicap parking and disable friendly washrooms for the convenience of the physically challenged staff.

Performance Appraisal System

- For Teaching Staff'

Though we do not have a formal mechanism of faculty appraisal, we do have a student feedback system through which the performance of the faculty is assessed and appraised. Google forms are uploaded on the college website under the section Feedback and get circulated through WhatsApp for collecting regular feedback from different stakeholders. The feedback is analyzed by the college IQAC team. On the basis of feedback, continuous review of assessment is carried out by respective committees and the recommendations are integrated for upgrading, maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. Any deficiency or lacunae in the faculty members' feedback is noted and the same is conveyed to the concerned faculty member for necessary correction and improvement. If need be, the principal

discusses the performance as well.

- For Non-teaching Staff

To examine the efficacy and effectiveness of procedures and processes adopted by the administrative staff of the college, the institution has a mechanism of Administrative Audit in place. Every year the Administrative Staff at different levels are required to fill up the performa. On the basis of the performa filled the performance is assessed and analyzed by the Administrative officer and Principal of the Colleg. 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Mobilization of funds

- The College receives 95% of its funds through UGC Grant and the remaining 5% is provided by Delhi government.
- Another source of funds mobilization is Student's Fee. The fees received from students are used for augmentation of physical infrastructure - library, building repairs, sports facilities, IT infrastructure and other facilities.
- Funds are also generated from rent from letting out various parts of land/building - photocopy shop, Canteen and bank etc.
- Grants from funding organizations like UGC, ICCSR and various ministries are also available in the form of grants to faculty members for projects, seminars and conferences. Similarly, various organizations like ICMR, SERB-DST fund projects that ensure functioning of the environmental labs.
- Dept. of Social Welfare monetarily sustains the FCC (Family Counseling Center).
- Various departments like Commerce and Economics mobilize funds from private companies who sponsor their activities like printing of posters, brochures and distribution of awards for their competitions and programmes.
- The College is mobilizing funds from two foreign language courses namely German and French which can be used for the development of the College.
- The College also outsources its building for conduct of examinations by several agencies on the

weekend.

- The IQAC is strengthening its alumni database to identify the most notable Alumni to generate funds for the development of the College.

Optimal use of funds

- The College has been using the Public Financial Management System for the Judicious Financial management. The online software is used for the purpose of payment and financial transactions.
- The College provides financial assistance to students from economically weaker sections in the form of contribution to tuition fees and complete tuition fee waiver to visually challenged students.
- The College also receives the funds from Help the Blind to contribute to their academic pursuit.

Internal and external financial audits

- The internal auditing is done by a Statutory Auditor, more commonly referred to as a Chartered Accountant (CA) whose appointment is approved by the Governing Body. He conducts regular review of all the financial records and books in the accounts branch. He ensures that all the financial records are in strict compliance with the norms of CAG. He also scrutinizes the balance sheet of the College. Each year the payment receipt, invoices and vouchers record are maintained meticulously which are scrutinized by the Chartered Accountant on a regular basis.
- Report of CA is placed before the Governing Body for approval and sent to funding agencies (UGC and Delhi Government).
- The external audit is done by CAG as per its own schedule, and it was done in 2016-17 for our college.
- Another external audit is done by the Examiner of Local Fund Accounts (ELFA), Govt. of NCT of Delhi, as our college gets 5% of its grants from the Delhi Government. The ELFA audited the college in 2018-19, as per its own schedule and resources. .

For faculty members

Faculty members are encouraged to participate in FDPs and other programmes including application of ICT in teaching and research to keep them updated about the changing trends in education and research. Various faculty development programs were organized to enhance their skills for teaching -learning process and also to acquaint them with their required roles, responsibilities and professional ethics.

- One week FDP (18.10.21-24.10.21) on “Meaningful Research and Intellectual Property Rights”.
- Two-weeks Interdisciplinary Refresher Course (8.11.21-22.11.21) on “Managing Online Classes and Co-creating MOOCs 9.0”.
- Three days’ workshop (August 2020) on Digital platforms for online teaching.
- NEP and Indian Knowledge Traditions (12.07.21),
- Research Methodology (19.07.21),
- Vigilance Awareness for Self-Reliance and Integrity (1.11.21),
- Role and Responsibilities of Faculty in Higher Education (29.11.21),
- Code of Professional Ethics (4.12.21).

For non-teaching staff:

IQAC organized different professional development programs, workshops and webinars for non-teaching staff to enhance their professional capabilities in different ways. These included:

- Motivation and Professional Development,
- Presentation Basics with PowerPoint and Excel Basics for Non-Finance Personnel,
- Effective Administration in Academic Institutions Through Transparency and Positive Interpretation of Rules
- Vigilance Awareness for Self-Reliance and Integrity
- Code of Professional Ethics.

Academic appraisal: IQAC is also actively involved in academic appraisal for both students and faculty members. Students feedback and APAR and PBAS are the mechanisms used for this assessment.

Promotion: IQAC facilitated the long pending promotions of faculty members to different levels from Assistant Professors to Professors.

The IQAC strives for optimal utilization of available infrastructural resources and its upkeep. It successfully made provisions and facilitated institutional email ids for faculty and students; provision for Smart classrooms, medical room, library (separate Teachers’ Reading section and PWD section), girls utility room; sewage work and renovation of toilets, administrative areas, lawns and sports grounds; eco-friendly campus, dedicated spaces for NAAC, IQAC, secure campus with 80 CCTVs. It has successfully initiated the following student centric courses/activities.

- Add-on courses have been offered free of cost to students to enhance their critical and analytical skills and make them more competitive. these include - Global Political Economy, An Introduction to Academic Writing and Problem Solving for Excellence.
- Academic Audit enables institutions to improve their teaching learning process.
- Mentor Mentees program: To strengthen communication between students and faculty. Mentoring students is a continuous process both inside and outside the classroom and it became even more crucial during the pandemic- induced lockdowns. Formal mentoring groups have been formed for this purpose.

- Feedback System is one of the student's grievances redressal mechanisms. A proper feedback mechanism has been put in place to take students' inputs pertaining to their entire college experience, covering administrative facilitation, library resources, student-teachers interaction, exposure to widespread academic and extracurricular activities. This feedback is analyzed and used for incremental improvements.

Satyawati College is committed to gender equity and inclusiveness.

- The college is named after **Satyawati Devi, a freedom fighter**, a symbol of women empowerment that inspires us to ensure gender parity as a social responsibility. We provide a 1% relaxation in admission related cut-offs marks for admission to girl students to encourage higher enrollment of women.
- At Satyawati College, we have a **dedicated curricular engagement with gender issues** through teaching-learning pedagogy. The recommended curricula in several courses offered by the college provide a crucial platform to initiate discourse pertaining to gender disparities. The English department offers a Generic Elective paper titled 'Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment'(GE6). Besides the formal curriculum, the college also organizes various extracurricular activities to boost the confidence and skills among girls so that they become an asset for the society and nation, especially under the aegis of Women Development Cell.
- We have instituted **special memorial awards for girl students**- Late Ms. Jaswant Kaur Memorial prize; Prof Brij Lal and Mrs. Sudesh Kumari awards for the two meritorious visually challenged girls.
- **International Women Day** is celebrated each year with gusto and participation of both genders is encouraged.
- Across our academic year, a plethora of activities are organized by Satyawati College to mark the **special occasions of national and international importance** to underscore glorious history, diversity, multilingualism, gender question, patriotism, health for all, cleanliness, environmental concerns, disabled-friendly campus, Indian leaders, universal brother/sisterhood, conservation, and multiculturalism of India. These celebrations facilitate the learners to take pride in human values, ethics of bravery and courage. At the onset of Corona, we shifted to online platforms and webinars to continue with our efforts to mark national and international occasions in an effort to inspire the students to face tough times with patience and positivity.

Gender sensitisation through extracurricular programmes

- NSS organizes various programmes like community outreach programmes, fundraising drives, sustainable environment and social work contributing to gender sensitisation. In 2017, students from our college participated in a workshop held by the University and were made Gender Champions for one year.

- The students also get experiential **socio-cultural awareness** during educational visits, film screenings by Cinepat: the film society, and awareness/sensitisation drives by NSS and NCC.

Best Practice 1: Eco-Friendly Campus.

1. Objectives:

- To propagate a healthy and sustainable way of living based on traditions and values of conservation and moderation.
- To practice **TRUE (Total Resource Use and Efficiency)** for efficient and ethical utilisation of water and energy resources.
- To initiate, inculcate and reinforce ‘green’ habits in our students through **5Rs- Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle** of waste management and **Respect Nature**.
- To include **Education for Sustainability (EfS) curriculum** across all classrooms for building knowledge and skills that lead to an environmentally sustainable world.

2. Context:

- The rapid increase in the urban centers has led to environmental degradation, creating the need to promote environmentally sustainable practices.
- Sensitising a generation of environmentally conscious students is of foremost priority of Satyawati College.

3. Practice:

- A **composting facility** is maintained for biodegradable waste, with the compost used by the inhouse nursery.

- An **electronic screen** displays all notices that contributes to lower paper usage.
- E-waste collection corners in the college are effective; the **Disposal committee** disposes the collection further in an ecologically safe manner.
- We are **registered with MSTC** (Metal Scrap Trade Corporation Limited), dedicated to E-Auction, trading and recycling of E-waste.
- Runoff from the college building's terraces is channelled into recharging pits at various locations.
- The subterranean collection pit intercepts runoff from the unpaved areas of the campus.
- The water is collected in three **rainwater harvesting** pits in line with established practices.
- We employ a combination of **LED and CFL** light systems which are energy saving. The air conditioning of the college is BEE rated.
- As part of our commitment to renewable energy, solar panels (98.88 KWh) have are installed on our rooftop.
- In tune with TRUE (Total Resource Use and Efficiency) the classrooms and labs have been designed to allow ample natural light reducing energy use.
- Sensor-based lighting control system has been installed in different galleries within our campus for energy conservation.
- The College organizes student competitions and events (Nukkad Nataks, plantation drives, Swacchata Abhiyaan, slogan and poster making competitions,) to foster a sense of social responsibility and create awareness on environmental challenges.
- **NCC and NSS wings** are active in reminding students to keep their campus and surroundings clean.
- As part of the **AECC curriculum**, annual field visits to Yamuna Biodiversity Park, Aravalli Biodiversity Park are organise regularly.

4. Evidence of Success:

- The installed solar panels meet our electricity needs, and surplus energy is fed to TPDDL and the evening college.
- The office repurposes single-sided printed sheets for printing notices and note pads.
- A pollution monitoring station in partnership with the Delhi Pollution Control Committee shows real-time data for particulate matter concentration in the area.

5. Problems:

- A positive **behavioural change** for raising ecologically sensitivity remains a challenge. The inculcation of habits that sustain our environment is essential for sustainability of our efforts. We strive to create an atmosphere that is conducive for changes in habits and behaviour.
- Proper waste disposal is expensive in the short run in terms of setting up equipment, which necessitates State support in the form of **financial aid and subsidy** for long term sustainability. Similar support in terms of equipment and its upgradation, trained human resources can go a long way to meet sustainable targets.

Best Practice 2: Disabled Friendly Campus.

1. Objectives:

- To promote an institutional culture for engagement, inclusivity and equal opportunity across activities for the development of differently-abled students.
- To counsel students to steer them towards self-reliance by honing their employability skills.
- To enhance the special services/facilities required by the PWD students.
- To oversee effective implementation of policies and programmes for PWD students.

2. Context:

- The Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) plans its activities and expenditure to address academic and social barriers faced by our PWD students. The activities include regular counselling, supplementary academic support, training, awareness and sensitization programmes.

3. Practice:

- A nominal fee is charged from PWD students.
- Annual distribution of Angel PRO devices.
- College provides laptops to all PWD students.
- College is equipped with Tactile path, lifts, disabled-friendly washrooms, ramps, for smooth movement of our PWD students and easy access to all facilities on the campus, and a designated parking space for them.
- The college has a dedicated space for interaction and counselling of PWD students in the form of an EOC room.
- The college facilitates scholarships to blind students that are sponsored by NGOs.
- The college library provides a dedicated space, printer and a Braille books section for blind students.
- The NSS unit provides reader facility to our blind students, with financial support for writing assistance during examinations from the college funds.
- Our Annual Sports Day event includes a special friendly cricket match for the blind students.

4. Evidence of Success:

- The inclusive annual festival of EOC, Umang awards the best and the brightest students for their performance in different art forms.
- Our PWD alumni have secured government jobs

5. Problems:

- **Transportation to college** remains a problem, which requires dedicated State support in the form

of special modes of travel for PWD students.

- The **lack of funds** hinders the implementation and maintenance of facilities for the PWD students. The inadequate human and financial resources for reader facility remains a key challenge.
- The use of digital platforms for cultural events challenges the participation of PWD students. The **loss of human touch** and daily interaction on campus is the biggest obstacle in all round development of our PWD students. The coordination, teamwork, and leadership qualities are difficult to imbibe in the same capacity in the online mode of education effectively.

Progressive Learning, Research and Excellence

Satyawati College aims at all-round development of students to create future leaders who can contribute significantly in social cohesiveness and nation building. It aims at academic excellence and progressive learning, using a student centric approach to impart knowledge. We provide tools, techniques and experience from our knowledge repository to learners to accelerate academic and non-academic excellence. With a sound and formal curricular infrastructure, the college works through various societies and committees that foster the development of soft and creative skills that enable professional growth of our students.

- To encourage robust, **participative and dialogic learning**, different societies strive to enhance communications skills, critical thinking, problem-solving ability, interpersonal skills and leadership qualities.
- The college puts a premium on hands-on **experiential learning** and outreach activities to groom students to contribute positively to transform society.
- The institution believes in promoting **student-centric research endeavours**, by collaborating with distinguished research centres including Center for Global Studies, Comparative Federalism Research Group.
- To keep in sync with specialised knowledge and give students a competitive edge, the college introduced several **add-on courses**.
- **Teacher's training and development programmes** are a routine practice in the college to allow faculty to keep abreast of latest knowledge, methods and technologies.

Students' Centric Progressive Learning Ecosystem

- **Digital platforms:** To overcome the interactive limitations during the pandemic and re-build a robust communication platform for all, the college subscribed to ZOOM Microsoft Team and Google Meet to make education more participative and interactive by organizing online webinars, seminars, workshops and conferences at national and international levels.
- **Wi-Fi enabled campus-**The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled, and all departments have a departmental room with a computer and printer facility. The students and faculty are issued an institutional ID to allow the use of e-resources through NLIST and DULS.
- **Add-on courses:** The college realizes the need to supplement the curriculum to meet academic, research and industry demands. Hence, the College introduced a series of free add-on courses to cater to the professional and research aptitude of the students. Our courses -*A Practical Introduction to Academic Writing, Introduction to Global Political Economy, and Problem Solving for Excellence* gave a competitively strengthened our students' credentials.
- **Soft skills Development:** Saksham, the Career Counselling Society and the Placement Cell, organises and annual INNOVISION fair as a platform for campus placement along with year round programmes to develop soft skills and interpersonal skills.
- **Startups:** The joint efforts of our students and teachers have resulted in developing industry-tailored individuals. Some of our students have successfully launched start-ups that are on way to becoming commercially viable projects in diverse industries that range from food to e-learning.

Robust Experiential Learning Framework

- **Fieldwork activities and educational trips:** To promote an experiential understanding of the concepts by bridging the gap between the classroom and the real world several departments and societies routinely organize fieldwork activities and educational trips.
- **Community Service:** The college also values community service as an integral part of personality development and social responsibility. Our NCC and NSS cadets have been instrumental in spreading awareness and participating in the philanthropic distribution of food and masks, and mobilising resources during the COVID period.
- **Lifelong learning:** The activities by our societies cultivate lifelong learning and ensure the social, physical and psychological well-being of our students and increase the opportunities for career/professional growth.

Focus on New Knowledge, Methods and Technologies.

- The institution places equal emphasis on teachers' training and Faculty Development Programmes in order to keep pace with the latest developments in the academic field. IQAC, Satyawati College constantly motivates Teacher-in-charges and Convenors of various societies to organize interdisciplinary programmes relevant to all stakeholders.
- IQAC has conducted several lectures/talks on diverse issues, both independently and in association with different departments and committees to facilitate the faculty skill-enhancement objectives. Some of the key endeavours include a week-long **Faculty Development Programme** on the topic 'Meaningful Research and Intellectual Property Rights' from 18.10.21- 24.10.21. and a **two-week interdisciplinary Refresher Course** on the topic Managing Online Classes and Co-Creating MOOCs 9.0 from 08.11.21-22.11.21, both in collaboration with Ramanujan TLC. A '**Teaching and Learning Workshop**' (10.9.21- 12.9.2021) was organised by the Department of Commerce in collaboration with the Department of Environmental Studies on online teaching platforms catering to online delivery during pandemic.

Research Initiatives: Projects and Publications

- **Research Supervision:** Research is a fundamental part of the academic life at Satyawati College. All faculty members and students are encouraged through numerous provisions to engage in substantive research and publication. Many faculty members are supervising Ph.D. and M.Phil. students from different Universities.
- **Research Publications:** The college has channelized human resources for optimization of national, regional, and global inquiry. Our faculty members have played a pivotal role in pushing the frontiers in many fields and have made strategic interventions in the academic thought process through their published books and research papers. In the last five years, a total of ? books and ? research articles have been published by our faculty.
- **Research Projects:** Our capacity to create new fields of enquiry and commitment to address critical social, regional and global issues reflects in the projects undertaken by faculty members that are sponsored by agencies like ICHR, ICSSR, ICMR, GOI and IOE.

- **Language courses** such as French and German and Add-on courses offered by different departments boost students' confidence, innovative thinking and problems solving skills. The organizing of department and different society activities enhance their leadership skill and provide opportunities for improving interpersonal skills. During the pandemic these activities continued in an online mode.

- The **faculty mentor students'** in their journey through college and facilitate the gradual shift to professional life through letters of recommendation and no objection certificates for higher education internships and summer training. - The college has **proactive links** with other colleges and industry, MOUs with different institutions and collaborations with MNCs, international banks and many esteemed research organizations.
- The college's **Physical Education department** nurtures sports talent, imparts holistic practices like yoga, gym and takes care of training needs of the disabled through a well-equipped sports complex.
- Students' need for developing skills, career opportunities and employability is met through various societies and an active Career Counseling and Placement Cell.
- The student representatives in department committees and different committees of the college get a taste of administrative responsibilities which draw out their soft skills for organisation and prepares them for a professional life after college.
- Our college serves as centre for **SOL and IGNOU**.
- The college plans to construct hostel for women students.
- The college is in the process of initiative a Research and Incubation Centre to promote innovation and research among students and faculties.

- Satyawati College strives to make its campus a **melting pot for diverse students** coming from different cultural, social, regional and economic backgrounds.
